Cub Program

Theme - Anzac Day - Simpson & his Donkey

This month there are obviously two themes available to us. I have chosen Anzac Day, and in particular the story of Simpson & his Donkey.

6.30pm Opening Ceremony (Akela & all Leaders)

6.35pm Game 1 - Crossing the Trenches (Bagheera)

It is World War 1 and trench warfare. There is mud everywhere. Your Six has to cross from one side of the battlefield to the other without touching the ground. All Cubs will have to work together to achieve the goal. If someone touches the ground, they must start over again.

Equipment - 4 chairs per every six Cubs (three chairs for every 4 or 5 cubs/two chairs for 3).

6.55pm Anzac Story - Simpson & his Donkey (Baloo)

Ask Cubs if they know the story. Fill in unknown details (only at Gallipoli for 24 days before he was killed. Rescued over 300 wounded soldiers in that

time. Started as a part of a 2 man stretcher bearer team, but found a stray donkey. Used more than 1 donkey but best known was "Duffy" (also Murphy, Abdul and Queen Elizabeth). Because of the donkey, he had to walk upright and was therefore the target of enemy snipers. Was aged 23 when he died. Was very strong as he worked as a Stoker on Merchant Navy ship.

7.10pm Boomerang Work (Test 1 - First Aid) - All Leaders

Point to point (5-7 mins each)

Tie a sling

Bleeding nose

Treating cuts

Recovery position

Alternate - Could do First Aid Kit Game/Cleanliness Quiz or discuss how to make an emergency call using a mobile phone to a Leader or Parent.

7.40pm Game 2 - Battlefield Obstacle Course (Chil and all Leaders)

Set up an Obstacle Course along the Hall (under tarpaulin, over chairs, walk along pole). Each Cub carries a stick (to represent a rifle) and this also acts as a relay baton. Alternate - May specify to do course in silence to avoid enemy fire (blind folded Leaders with bean bags throwing at any noises they hear).



FEE RESTRUCTURE.

Some members may be wondering why the 2012 increase in our Annual fees to \$45. In actual fact, this is a reality check necessary for us to catch up, or, put simply, there has not been an increase with our Fellowship membership registrations for around 12 years now.

I did a 'spot check' Nationally to see how we fare and here are a few sample comparisons for all to consider - in NSW, Fellowship members (because they are officially the sixth Scouting section) pay at least \$110 yearly; ACT members pay \$132 yearly; and in Victoria it is \$70 yearly. Incidentally, while NSW & Victoria may outdo us numberwise, there are only 27 Fellowship members in the ACT. As such, we retain the most inexpensive Fellowship registration within Australia.

GRANTS REPORT

The **TCF Grant (Round 24)** has only one applicant in category 2 closing on 4 April. The usual problem has arisen again in that it always takes longer to prepare applications that involve building. Each year I implore Groups to start planning for **building approval at least 6 months** before

the due date of the Grant as they need planning permission (from local Council) which includes plumbing (if applicable), water & sewerage connections etc. and these take time! To compound the problem, and I'm guilty of not emphasising this fact, is that TOPS states clearly that all Scout properties are registered in BHQ's name and any building, alterations etc to Scout properties MUST go through a District Exec. Committee for endorsement. If granted then the proposal will be forwarded to BHQ for submission to the Branch Property Committee who meet every month.

After approval from the Property Committee THEN the project can be submitted to Council. The Groups, who are going through this process now, if approved, COULD have their TCF submission ready by the 11 August Grant Round 26.

There are quite a few applications to various Councils Community Grant programs in the pipeline and hopefully these will be successful.

During the past month I've also sent out more notices (thanks to Jeannette) of other Grants now available, the Southern Water Community Grant (this may also apply to other regions; CMW is to offer rebates for water & sewerage to NPO soon?), Mercy Foundation and the free Grant writing workshops for N & NW areas. I haven't heard of any applications or a report from anyone attending the workshop. If you have applied/attended PLEASE let me know!!

Grants still available are; Inger Rice Foundation Grant, Matana Foundation, Sidney Myer Fund, Bendigo Bank (details not clear!), Shanahan Foundation Grant closing 13 April, Ian Potter Foundation Grant closing 28 May - some are ongoing.

Local Councils Community Grants – George Town (ongoing), Meander Valley Council ongoing, N Midlands ongoing, Launceston City ongoing, Central Coast Council (closes 13 April), Burnie Council (closes 18 April)


Some Councils do not list – contact your local Council for info.
