Training Report

National Training Committee Meeting Report

On the weekend of the 19th and 20th of May I attended the National Training Committee meeting at Tree Tops which is located north of Sunbury in Victoria. The National Adventurous Activities (AA) meeting was held at the same time and location.

The meeting had a very full agenda including a number of sessions with the AA committee.

Here is an overview of the weekend:

E-Learning has now been successfully implemented in all branches. New Leaders in all branches have embraced the system and provided regular feedback (mostly good). It is interesting to note that training completion rates have improved.

The following modules will be incorporated into E-Learning this year:

Introduction to Advanced Training, Advanced Scout Safe, Advanced Leader of Adult (LoA), Advanced programming.

The World Scouting elective will be changed to include a cultural diversity and an international activity.

The Rover Review has been completed and is awaiting implementation.

Adventurous Activities training modules will be added to E-Learning.

Outdoor recreation (SIS 10) has been added to the scope of registration of Scouts Australia Institute of Training (SAIT). This will enable Leaders and Venturers to gain qualifications (Certificate II – Diploma) in areas such as bushwalking, kayaking and abseiling.

I will provide more details next month.

A new training module for PLA's has been developed to give them a better understanding of Elearning and the VET system. We will start rolling this out in Tasmania later this year to existing PLA's and then to all new PLA's.

There is a new web site for Leaders called **Scout Central** to be released shortly. It will contain Leader resources and an application to enable us to share ideas, programmes and information. There is also a new app for both the I-phone and Android.

New Leader Training

Attention new Leaders, Group Leaders and Commissioners.

New Leaders must complete their E-Learning prior to attending the Basic Sectional Training course. This is strictly policed. New Leaders should apply to attend the next Basic Sectional Training using the TOP 7 form as soon as they have completed E-Learning.

New Leaders who have completed their E-Learning are not qualified and therefore not permitted to run sectional meetings unless there is a qualified Leader (with a COAL) in attendance.

As soon as the new Leader has completed all formal training, it is essential that the Team Leader and the PLA ensures that in-service training and the final assessment is completed and returned to BHQ in a timely manner so that the COAL can be issued.

A final reminder to all is that the process from induction to the completion of training is not to exceed 12 months.



You can use them at your next camp, or there are some that can be used during a normal pack meeting – provided that you are prepared.

Palaver 2012

We had 21 Leaders attend the Palaver at Carnacoo on 19th - 20th May, and for once the weather was very kind to us, and as the theme for this year was "Outdoor Cubbing", most of our activities on Saturday were able to be done outdoors. With the help of Allen Wells (DSL Northern Midlands), we started the day reviewing our lashings, and then in our three sixes, we built dining shelters for dinner that night. We then did sessions on mapping, use of the compass, gadgets, wide games and then we talked about camp cooking. Upon receiving their recipes & ingredients, each Six then went off and prepared and cooked their own dinners. When done, everyone got a chance to sample each of the three dishes, and whilst not biased, I am sure that my six cooked the best meal on the night (sorry no correspondence entered into here). On Sunday, we were invited by the Joeys to join in their sessions on First Aid and a talk by Mary Landers on the Tassie Devil programme. Cub Program

Campfire Cooking

This month, as it is getting colder, I thought that I would look at what you can do around a campfire. Cubs really like the idea of campfire cooking, but to teach them to do it well, you need to be well prepared, and try to have everything prepared beforehand.

Just remember, there are two big mistakes that inexperienced campfire cooks make.

The first is you can not get the fire going in five minutes. It always takes longer than you think. Therefore, if you are having a cooking night, make sure that the fire gets started at least 30 minutes before your night begins, so that here are plenty of coals when you need them.

That leads to the second mistake. Do not try to cook on the flames, use the coals instead. It is these coals that give you good, even heat.

As an old Leader of mine once said, "Get your fire going early, before everyone gets hungry. It's no fun to try to cook this way when everyone is starving."

Here are some recipes ideal for Cubs that can be prepared, cooked and eaten simply. If you want some more robust Recipes ask one of your Scout Leaders.

Pocket One-ders	Hobo Packs
Requires: Aluminium Foil Olive Oil Lemon slices Potatoes – thinly sliced	For cooking utensils, you'll need heavy-duty alu- minium foil, paper towels and a permanent mark- er. In separate containers, offer:
Carrots – diced Tomatoes – diced Onions – diced Other Vegetables as required	Mince or diced raw meat Thinly sliced potatoes Carrots, diced Capsicum, diced Mushrooms, sliced
Seasonings Method: Tear off a 30cm sheet of heavy duty foil and fold it back over your fist, making a "pocket". Roll the sides in a few turns so the pocket is only open at the top, and roll a turn or two up from the bottom for extra strength. The pocket needs to be leak- proof, and formed well enough to withstand cook- ing directly in the coals. If your foil is thin, you may need two layers. Start by lining the bottom of the pocket with thin slices of lemon. This helps keep the food contents from burning, and imparts flavour to the meal. Chop potatoes and carrots (cut small enough to cook all the way without overcooking everything else), tomatoes, onions, other vegetables as re- guired, etc. and stuff the pockets. Add, salt and	Mushrooms, sliced Salt Pepper Worcestershire or steak sauce (optional) Method: To assemble the hobo packs, issue each diner two 30cm long pieces of heavy-duty aluminium foil and a wet paper towel. Sandwich the wet paper towel between the two pieces of foil. Moisture from the towel helps food cook more evenly and keeps the edges from drying out. Diners then move down the line of food containers, adding what they like to the centre of their foil. At the end of the assembly line, fold the foil around the food. Mark each hobo pack with the diner's initials and place the pack on warm coals for 10 to 20 minutes, depending on the ingredients and weight of the pack.
pepper and olive oil. Add 1/4 cup of water, fold the top edges of the pocket closed and set direct- ly into the hot coals. It takes anywhere from 20 to 40 minutes, de- pending on how everything's cut. All the vegies slow roast in their own juices!	Remove the hobo packs from the coals with tongs and let them cool for a few minutes. You can eat the meal right out of the foil.



Omelettes in a Bag

For a quick, hearty breakfast with very little clean-up. This dish also follows the assembly line method above so that each diner can customise his or her meal. You can offer as many ingredients as you like to add to the omelettes, but having too many choices may overwhelm the younger campers.

Eggs Shredded cheese Diced ham Diced tomato Other omelette fillings (optional)

As for supplies, you'll need the following to make this dish: Large pot of boiling water Pint-sized, heavy-duty zipper bags Permanent marker

Line up the ingredients in an assembly line, beginning with the eggs. Each person breaks the desired number of eggs for his or her omelette into the bag, then seals the bag and kneads the eggs through the bag to "beat" them. Then diners walk down the line of ingredients, adding what they like to their bag. At the end of the line, they seal the bag, pressing out all the air, knead the ingredients to mix them and write their initials on the bag with the permanent marker.

Drop the bags into the boiling water. When the eggs are cooked through, remove the bag with tongs.

Hollow Potatoes

Just like the previous recipe, however, this time the eggs are cooked inside the potato.

Medium Size potatoes - ! per Cub Eggs Shredded cheese Diced ham Diced tomato Other omelette fillings (optional)

Other Supplies: Heavy duty aluminium Tooth picks Metal spoons Permanent marker

Wash the potato thoroughly and cut off the top. Using a metal spoon, hollow out the inside of the potato so that the sides are about 5mm thick. Using the production line above, add the egg and other ingredients, then put the top back on the potato and fix in place with the toothpicks. Wrap in the aluminium foil, and place in the hot coals for approximately 20 minutes or until the potato is cooked (Note: as the potato is hollow is does not take as long to cook).

An item from Robyn Lewis, a Lindisfarne Venturer on her recent trip to Sweden.

Svenska Scoutförbundet - Scouterna

During the Swedish summer/Australian winter 2011, I attended the 22nd World Scout Jamboree in the province of Skäne. This gave me an obvious opportunity to learn about Scouting & community life in Sweden. I took the opportunity to participate in a 3 night 'home hospitality', in which a patrol of Scouts from another country stayed either in individual homes with a patrol of Swedish Scouts, or together with them in a Scout Lodge. I was allocated to a scout lodge in southwestern Sweden, in a small town called Anderslöv.

It's interesting, foremost, to note that around 2/3 of all Swedish citizens either are, or have at one point in their lives, been in the Scouting Movement. It is incredibly prevalent, and the community attitude towards Scouting is very different to the sometimes-dated reputation it gets in Australia. Not only is this the case, but they also get huge amounts of funding from both the government, and businesses. The unit from Trelleborg (the ones I was staying with) got in excess of \$80,000 AUD per annum from a fishing company whose factories were nearby. This sort of money allows the Scouts a certain amount of luxury. For example, their Scout Hall is a five-storey Georgian-style house, complete with its own library, museum, Jacuzzi and fully functioning kitchen & formal dining room. They also own their Scout Lodge, in Anderslöv. This in itself was amazing, with a backyard backing onto a huge amount of forest, for hiking in. The lodge had two storeys, a sauna, Internet connection, laundry, and once again, large formal dining room. To the Australians, this was unheard of. For a single Scout Group to be able to own and maintain these two properties was incredible, and so were the differences in their attitudes towards risk assessment, etc.

For a start, Swedish Scouts don't need to have female Leaders accompany them everywhere! Our patrol was lead by David, and we had to especially ensure a female Leader came with us, as per Australian rules. This caused a few hassles, as the leader had her own patrol she was supposed to be with in another location. Secondly, the female & male Scouts share the same rooms, and usually the same beds. This doesn't cause an issue for them, which was a very novel concept for us. Under 18's and over 18's were not usually separated either, although the older Leaders did prefer to sleep upstairs in proper beds rather than on the communal beds with sleeping bags that we all shared. Perhaps the strangest thing to the Australians in this regard, was their nightly sauna ritual. Everyone piled, naked into the sauna, and would sit there for an hour or two, just talking and often singing. While this would clearly not be permitted in Australian Scouting, after we got used to the idea, it was a pleasant experience, and one that I'm sure we will all remember.

In Sweden, even if you own land, other people still have the right to walk on it, collect berries, make fires, horse ride, and camp. Going hiking and camping isn't rare for them – they can do it all the time! The first full day we had there, after a traditional Swedish Scouting breakfast of porridge with salmon caviar, they took us out for the day, wandering through the countryside. We walked through farms with cows, deer, crops, rivers, and hunting lookouts. The concept of being able to freely walk on land (with the principle of leaving nothing behind, and causing no economic damage) was amazing! We made a fire on the ground to cook lunch with, and pulled twigs off nearby trees to snare sausages.

The only distinction between female and male members is the badge on their uniform, and the world organisation with which they're registered. While the girls don't call themselves Guides, they have the world-guiding badge on their uniform, while the boys have the world Scouting one that we use as Scouts in Australia. The female members are also registered with WAGGS instead of WOSM.

One aspect of Swedish Scouting that we all really liked was their commitment to social justice. All of their uniforms are made with fair-trade material, and they also sell a wide array of pretty awesome clothes that support environmental charities. It's common, on the streets, to see people with Scouting accessories, even if they aren't in the movement. Scouterna shops are common, and the designs are all modern, and well liked. While of course a certain amount of profit is made, much of the money from these shops goes to NGOs. Many of the Youth involved are passionate about environmental/social justice issues, and a lot of groups run their own programs similar to Landcare, or do a large amount of fundraising for causes of their choosing. Because most of the Leaders in Sweden are under 30 (this is mandated in some places), they often have similar outlooks on these sorts of issues to their Scouts, and often are just as active in the service projects as the Scouts are.
