Chief Commissioner's Report

It is with great sadness that we record the passing of Ray Christie on 6th September in his 80th year. Ray was a great Scout, Leader and friend to many in Tasmania. Ray was a Scout in Queensland and a Leader in NSW and Queensland before he moved to Tasmania in the 1960's. He was a Leader at Lindisfarne Group for over 30 years, District Commissioner, Regional Commissioner, Branch

Commissioner of Scouts Chief Commissioner of Tasmania 1988 – 1993 and Branch Life Member. The wide cross section of people at his funeral, including his past Scouts from over four decades, is a testament to the achievements of a life well lived. Ray was at the forefront of many significant changes in Scouting including the membership of girls in Scouting and changes to the retirement age of Leaders. He is remembered for his strong leadership, his attention to detail and the high standards he set for himself and those around him. Few Leaders have ever had as many of their ex-scouts follow in their footsteps and become Leaders. The whole Scouting community extend their sympathy to Beryl , their children and their extended family. Ray will be greatly missed.

Training Report

Course Reports

TAE40110

Three students are progressing through the modules at a steady pace. They have completed module 1. Module 2 training was over the weekend of 14^{th} – 16^{th} September. Module 3 training will be in early October.

I will be running Module 1 again in November for Trainers and Adventurous Activities Leaders.

Basic Seamanship training was run over the weekend of $21^{st} - 23^{rd}$ of September with approximately 20 participants. The feedback from the course was very good.

National Training Committee

The National Training Committee conference was held in Canberra over the weekend of 21^{st} – 23^{rd} September. The Committee is responsible for Adult training in Australia and is directly responsible to the Chief Commissioner of Australia. Some of the outcomes of the conference were:

E-learning. Modules that reference "Areas of Personal Growth and the Scout Method" are currently being updated.

The electives on motivation, human relationships, bullying and time management are set for release.

Five new Advanced core and section modules are under development as well as a number of Adventurous Activities common core modules.

Most of these modules will be available before December.

I am pleased to announce that we can now train and assess Module 1 of the TAE40110 in house. The units of competency are; TAEDEL301A Provide work skill instruction, TAEASS401A Plan assessment activities and processes, TAEASS402A Asses competence, TAEASS403A Participate in assessment and BSBCOMM401A Make a presentation. This module is an essential requirement for all Trainers, Adventurous Activities Guides and Instructors.

There is also new training material for PLA's, but more about this next month.

Pathfinder Camps 2012

Successful Pathfinder Camps were held in September in both the North West and North of the State. Here is a quick report on the Northern Pathfinder from Jillian Parkinson (DCSL Launceston & Tamar):

The Northern Districts held their Pathfinder Camp at Skemps, near Myrtle Park. We had 5 patrols attend. The patrols set camp in near freezing conditions, and it was no surprise when snow fell during the evening. Luckily it did not settle, although there was a good frost on the tents the next morning. With the fantastic assistance of some of our Scout Leaders the patrols constructed dining shelters and kitchen tables on Saturday morning. In the afternoon the patrols rotated around several activities including woggle making, first aid, toasting fork construction, a compass trail and a short walk to observe the "chimney" of the native Engaeus, or Burrowing Freshwater Crayfish. Then each patrol had to set and light their own cooking fire, and cook a two course meal for themselves and their Leaders. After tea we had a campfire. After another cold night the first task on Sunday was to take down their constructions. We then allowed them some free time to explore the property or just relax and mix with the other patrols.

Cub Program

Theme: Parent & Cub Night

A great idea to get Parents involved in your Pack is to have a Parent & Cub night. Whilst Mothers Day & Fathers Day are always a good time to do this (ie Mother/Cub or Father/Cub nights), in this age of more and more single parent families, it is sometimes a good idea just to do it for no other reason but a fun night for the Cubs to show off what they are doing each week. Accordingly, a "Parent" can be a mother, a father, a grandparent or even an adult relative.

Try to do activities & games that you have done with the Cubs on previous occasions and let the Cubs explain the rules to the Parents as you go along. Here are a few ideas

6.30pm Opening Parade

Akela & all Leaders

Ask Parents to form a circle behind their own Cubs after Grand Howl but before you break the flag

6.35pm Game 1 – Find Your Parent

Mowgli

Have everyone form into a circle, with the Parents & their Cubs next to each other. Now have the Cubs move into the centre and form their own circle inside the first. On command, the parent circle starts walking clockwise, whilst the cub circle walks anticlockwise. The Leader in Charge then blows a whistle. One blast means change directions, whilst two blasts means that the parent & cub must find each other. Last to do so is eliminated and you start again.

6.45pm Game 2 - Hot Rods

Bagheera

Have the Parents line up at one end of the Hall and the Cubs line up at the other so that each Parent is lined up with their own Cub. Go along the line and number each pair from 1 to how ever many people you have on the night. Draw a large figure 8 in the centre of the hall with chalk and place a tin can (or any other object that can be pushed with a stick) at two opposite points on the 8, and place a stick next to it. The Leader then calls a number. The corresponding Parent & Cub run to the nearest can and have to push it around the figure 8 back to its starting point and be the first to return to their line. Continue until everyone has had a turn.

7.00pm Game 3 – Ropes

Baloo

A bit of a quieter game for the Parents to get the breaths back. Have the Cubs teach their Parents how to tie a number of different knots including a reef knot, a clove hitch and something else you have done recently.

7.15pm Game 4 - Mimes

Rama

This one is Parents verses the Cubs. Have a number of different activities printed out on two separate sheets. These could include different sporting activities, household chores, professions, etc. Make sure that the ones for the Parents are harder of course. The Parents then have to mime their activities for the Cubs and the Cubs have to guess what they are doing. Repeat the process, this time with the Cubs miming for the Parents to guess their activity. Most number of correct guesses wins

7.30pm Game 5 – Obstacle Course

Kaa

Set up a number of obstacles around the hall, including a tarpaulin that you have to go under, ropes and chairs that have to be climbed over or through. Now join Parent & Cub together (either by the hand, or in a three legged race style) and have the pairs complete the obstacle course via a relay style race.

- **7.45pm Supper**. Provide the Parents with tea and coffee, served by the Cubs. Other food can be supplied by the Cubs.
- **7.55pm** Closing Parade

Cub Program continued

Some other activities you may like to try:

Skits or Songs – Have the Cubs sing to some of their camp fire songs to the parents, or perform one of their skits.

Senses Training – Have the Cubs prepare a number of tasting cups (sauce, vegemite, custard powder, salt, etc) and blind fold the parents and ask them to name each item.

Message Relay - Cubs verses Parents or Parent to Cub

Cub Carry – The parents have to carry the Cubs in a relay style race. How they carry them is up to you.

I have now received the badges from National and there was a slight increase in the cost of the badges, but at the moment I will NOT be passing on the increase to you, and therefore the badge cost still remains the same of \$1:50 each.

Forms and information should now be available on the Branch's web site page (www.tas.scouts.com.au) and then go to Events on menu bar and click on JOTA/JOTA or alternatively, click on JOTA /JOTI in the 'Latest News & Updates'. There is a wide range of information to help you in planning and running JOTA / JOTI.

Throughout the year I ran three of the four JOTA/JOTI reports that were submitted from Groups / Sections and in turn were forwarded on to National.

This is the fourth in the series of reports from Groups that took part in last year's JOTA /JOTI and some of their activities etc. may give you some ideas and be helpful while running your JOTA/JOTI.

Adventurous Activities

Greetings to all Scouters – as this is my first article for the Newsletter as Branch Commissioner for Adventurous Activities, there are quite a few items which have arisen and require further discussion and explanation.

Firstly, I would like to express my thanks to David Chalk as the previous Branch Commissioner for Adventurous Activities for his continuing help and assistance whilst I am getting into the complexities and requirements of the position. David's knowledge and experience gained from his term as Branch Commissioner is considerable and hopefully will be available to the Scouting Movement for some time yet. Thanks again David.

As David undertook in his term, I intend to ensure that as many Scouters and Youth Members within the Tasmanian Branch have as many opportunities as possible to undertake as many Adventurous Activities and where possible, to achieve and further any relevant qualifications. Of recent times, approval has been granted for Scouts Australia, as a registered Training Organization, to be able to conduct and qualify participants to Certificate IV in Outdoor Recreation. Accordingly, Venturer Scouts can undertake training up to Cert. III level as part of their Award Scheme with Scouters being able to complete the Cert. IV in Outdoor Recreation. If there are any Leaders who are interested in looking at the requirements, then by all means don't hesitate to contact either myself or the Training Team.

The Training Calender for 2013 has been virtually completed with courses being planned for abseiling, bush-walking and canoe/kayaking throughout the year. Most of the courses as planned are at around the same time of the year as those conducted this year but will be advertised in the Newsletter on a regular basis.

One course which is planned for early in 2013 is the Adventurous Activities Common Core and How to Instruct – it would be great to see as many Leaders as possible at these courses as it would be good start to the Scouting Year.

It is also intended to conduct an Abseiling Instructor Course next year over several weekends, which will qualify those Leaders who wish to further their knowledge/experience and obtain a qualification.

In January, 2013, Girl Guides Australia is conducting a nation-wide camp based at Quercis Park at Carrick with approximately 1,500 participants of all ages. Included in their activities will be the usage of the abseiling/climbing tower which was used for Wild-Dayz in January this year for the Australian Venture.

The dates on which the tower will be operating will be 7^{th} January to 11^{th} January, 2013 and will be manned by Scouting personnel. If there are any Leaders who would like to improve their abseiling/climbing skills or who are looking at increasing the log-book requirements for further qualifications, then please do not hesitate to contact me as I will be assembling the team to operate the tower soon. If people are available even for a single morning or afternoon session (without committing to the whole of the period), then I would most certainly like to hear from you.

Finally, as an advance notice of up-coming events, it is proposed that there will be the first National School in Adventurous Activities to be conducted at Cataract Scout Park in New South Wales between 13th January and 25th January, 2014. It is proposed as a 2-week camp for Venturers, Rovers and Leaders to achieve nationally accredited qualifications in Outdoor Recreation – Certificates II, III or IV or partial completion, depending on competency. Cost is \$995 plus transport to site. More information will be provided as the event comes closer.

Adventurous Activities continued

With winter coming to a close and day-light saving due to start fairly soon, it is hoped that the various Sections are looking at their respective programmes and building into the programmes the opportunities to be out-doors and undertaking some adventurous activities, either for the sheer enjoyment of participating in those activities or as part of the on-going Award Schemes.

I look forward to meeting as many Leaders and Youth Members in my travels.

GRANTS REPORT

In July's Newsletter I reported that I'd been invited to participate in a Grants in Australia Survey. There were over 550 responses to more than 50 clauses in the survey. I've chosen 6 results that were given in detail reports. These results are in brief:-

- That grant making is an absolutely central element in the Australian economy [VALUE FOR MONEY].
- That every grant should be an improvement on the last grant [EVALUATION].
- That Australia needs more and better professional grant makers [PROFESSIONALISM].
- That grant makers should listen to the communities they serve [RESPONSIVENESS].
- That grant makers should be efficient [EFFICIENCY].
- That grant makers should be ethical [ETHICS].

If you are interested I can provide you with more detailed information.

There have been further Grant successes with congratulations firstly, to 4th Launceston, who received \$5,617 from the Commonwealth Bank 2012 Community Grant. Secondly, to Turners Beach who received \$1,703 for kayaks and tents plus a further \$500 for their Jamboree Funds from the **Apex Club of Ulverstone**. The latter was due to the foresight of GL Eunice Horne who saw a Newspaper advert and wrote to Apex with a great result – this is a first as far as I know - well done. (Some nice pics but sorry no room to include in this report, see page 19

Quite a few Grant Alerts have been sent out (courtesy Jeannette), one for a FREE Grant Writing Workshops (courtesy DPaC) to be held state-wide, starting 25 September in Exeter through to 26 October on Flinders Island. If anyone is going to attend a session I would appreciate a feedback as such offers are few and far between.

There are still a few ongoing grants from last month, Junior Landcare, NAB Employee Grant, CheaperthanHotels Fundraising Program. Others Grants such as Telstra's Kids Fund, Bell Bay Aluminium (Pacific Aluminium), St George Funding were sent out courtesy Jeannette again. Still waiting for some good news concerning another grant source which I hope is soon. Local Councils Community Grants – George Town (ongoing), Meander Valley Council ongoing, N Midlands ongoing, Launceston City Community Grants Program ongoing. - · You must be available to attend two conferences held on a weekend in March and September. (The cost is covered by Scouts Australia).

Your application, along with your three references, and other information needed, will be sent to your Branch Chief Commissioner to check and approve.

Crunching the Numbers of AJ2013

When hosting an event as large as the 23rd Australian Scout Jamboree (AJ2013), there's going to be huge numbers involved, not only regarding the people. The 11,500 Scouts and Leaders won't have to worry about getting hungry at all with the amounts of food they are being supplied. With 114,000 eggs being sent to the site, they can enjoy a lovely breakfast while toasting some of the 22,500 loaves of bread – for a traditional baker's dozen, that's 292,500 slices! Wash that down with a portion of the 48,900 litres of fruit juice and you're ready for they day. During the day they don't have to fret about being peckish with approximately 340,000 snack bars being sent and another 340,000 juice poppers as well. Come dinnertime, to refuel the participants for the night's events, they have on option 1,400 kilograms of spiral pasta or even 6,510 plus kilograms of baked beans. That's a lot of gas – 9,000 kilograms in 1,000 gas bottles to be precise.

Don't worry about the germs and contagions that you fear may be around, with 10,000 bottles of hand sanitizer onsite, there's no reason for uncleanliness. As the night winds down and everyone returns to their campsites, why not mix up a batch of hot Milo using some of the 700 tins available. For all this food there needs to be a place to store it. There are 550×73 litre eskies with another 550×70 litre plastic food crates – plenty of room! To keep it chilled in the expected warm weather, why not take advantage of the 16,000 plus bags of ice that will be used. So when you take this all into perspective you can see how bulky an event like AJ2013 is – lots of people, lots of food, lots of fun. **Dream It Live It**.

We would like to involve more parents and others associated with your Troop/Unit in assisting with in-shore safety on the water. If you know of someone who has small boat experience, who is willing to help, and who has a small dinghy or rubber ducky with an outboard motor, then the Committee would like to contact them.

D CONSENT

The 'Leader in Charge at Regatta' needs to sign and date this section.

Youth members under the age of 18 must have at least one adult for every 10 Youth members or part thereof camping with them. Scout and Venturer Units with male and female youth members must have both male and female Leaders. Participating Youth members must be at least 10 years old at the time of the Regatta. Endeavour to have at least two parents for every 10 Youth members available during the Regatta for the duties and security shifts which will be allocated to your section.

E OTHER DETAILS

We appreciate numbers may change after your section has registered. Please advise Lyn Muir of changes to your entry numbers up to 1st March by filling in the Additional Entries form. Remember that for entries received between 16 December and 23 February the fee increases by \$10. The additional fee for entries received between 24 February and 1 March is \$20. We cannot accept entries after 1st March.

F REFUNDS

The Regatta Committee will approve refunds for reduced numbers after the Regatta. Generally a decrease in numbers advised by 23 February will be refunded 100% and if advised by 1 March there will generally be a 50% refund. Changes to the numbers registered cannot be made at the Regatta.
