Christmas Card Templates

Christmas Trees

You need: A blank card, a Christmas tree template, red and green paper (or card), Red and gold glitter, Glue

Cut out a Christmas tree template for everyone to use and have every one make one red tree and two green trees. Decorate the trees with glitter and leave to dry. Next, glue the trees in a straight line down the front of the card. Cut around the right hand side of the trees on the front of the card.

You can use any shapes and any colour of paper and glitter to make your cards.

Fabric Edged Cards

You Need: A card blank, glue, Christmassy patterned fabric, stickers or die-cut shapes (or any other decoration you like), patterned edged scissors (such as pinking shears)

Cut a fancy edge on to your fabric. Glue the fabric to the card so it is on the folded edge side and the patterned edge sits in the middle of the card. Trim around the edge of the card to remove any excess fabric. Decorate the outside edge of the card with stickers or pre-cut shapes or any other decoration you like.



Stripy Christmas Card

You Need: Scraps of different coloured paper, card blank, glue stick

Cut your strips of paper to length and arrange on the card blank until you are happy with the design. Add a small rectangle in contrasting colour for the base. Now glue each strip down, starting

from the top, and keeping your fingers as clean as possible. You might want to cover the card with a clean sheet of paper before pressing the strips down carefully.

Stained Glass Windows

You Need: Stiff clear plastic pieces, card blank, PVA glue, permanent markers, food colouring, small paint brushes and toothpicks

On one side of the plastic, draw or trace a Christmas scene using one of the permanent markers. Mix the food colouring with the PVA glue in some different pots. Use small paint brushes and toothpicks to paint on the plastic on the opposite side to the permanent markings. When the 'paint' dries clear, you have a stained glass ornament that can be mounted on your card blank.

This idea can also be used to paint glass jars.

Cooking

Easy Christmas Puddings

You Need: Arnotts Chocolate Royal biscuits, icing sugar, mint leaves, Jaffas

Prepare some icing. Each Chocolate Royal biscuit needs two mint leaves and one Jaffa. Smear some icing across the top of the Chocolate Royal. Place the holly (Jaffa) and mint leaves on one side. Let the icing set.

Christmas Pudding Pops

You Need: 1 traditional Christmas pudding (or leftovers), ice cream sticks or skewers, white or milk cooking chocolate, toasted shredded coconut.

Line a tray with baking paper. Take a tablespoon of pudding and roll into balls (Note: The pudding will be easier to roll if it is warm. Place it in the microwave for a minute). Place the balls onto the tray and insert an ice cream stick or skewer into each one. In a glass bowl, heat the chocolate for 30 second intervals in the microwave, stirring constantly until the chocolate is melted and smooth. Next, dip each of the balls into the chocolate to coat and then cover in the shredded coconut. Leave to cool or place in fridge until chocolate hardens.

Christmas Chocolate Spoons

You Need: Plastic spoons, Ziplock bags, Christmas style ribbon, white chocolate, milk chocolate, cashews, Hundreds & Thousands, cachous (those shiny little balls)

Lay the spoons out on a tray that you have covered with baking paper. Prop the end of the spoons up so that they are level. In a glass bowl, heat the white chocolate for 30 second intervals in the microwave, stirring constantly until the chocolate is melted and smooth. Pour the melted chocolate into a ziplock bag.

Repeat with the milk chocolate. Next, snip a small corner of the ziplock bags and fill half of the spoons with white chocolate & the other half with milk chocolate. Tap each spoon so that the chocolate levels out in the spoon. Next, pour more chocolate into a fresh ziplock bag, cut a very small corner off, and pipe designs onto your chocolate spoons White chocolate on milk chocolate and vice versa. Finally, decorate with cashews, hundreds & thousands, Cachous and tie some ribbon to each spoon. Place tray into refrigerator to set.

Mars Bar Crackles

You Need: 2 x 12 cup mini muffin trays, 3 x 200gm Mars Bars (chopped), 2 x tablespoons of pouring cream, 2 x teaspoons cocoa powder, 3 x cups Rice Bubbles, 1 x cup dried fruit (optional), canola spray, white chocolate, Smarties or M&Ms, ziplock bags.

Spray the canola spray into the mini muffin trays. Melt the Mars bars, cream & cocoa powder in a glass bowl over simmering water (the bowl should not touch the water). Stir the mixture until smooth. Put the rice bubbles and dried fruit in a separate large bowl, pour in the chocolate mixture and stir until well combined. Spoon the mixture into the muffin trays and press down gently.

Refrigerate for 2 hours and turn out of the trays to decorate. Melt the chocolate (as above), put into the ziplock bags and cut off a very small corner. Turn the crackles upside down and pipe the chocolate on and finish with a red Smartie or M&M on each one.
