Chief Commissioner's Report Cont'd

It looks like most of the information on the new Award Scheme is in place (handbooks and posters), except that the app for the phones/tablets/computers is not quite finished; hopefully this will be completed by the time we start our training for the Pioneer Groups in November. It looks very exciting and very simple once you get your head around the concept.

Unfortunately, we are having a lot of problems in getting our Adult members (that includes Leaders, Adult Helpers, Life Members, Fellowship members, and Chairpersons, Secretaries and Treasurers on Group and District Committees) to renew their Police Checks, Working With Vulnerable People Cards and the two compulsory online modules Bcore Child and Bcore WHS. As this is a National Child Safe requirement that all of these members do these, unfortunately, I might have to suspend members who have not completed these requirements. Can all Group Leaders and District Commissioners make sure that their Adult Members are up to date with these new requirements. Lori and Sharon have been emailing you with names.

WA Uni has been working on a survey for us for some time now and their work is now completed. Victoria is working with WA Uni to trial their ideas and the report we received from the Victorian Chief Commissioner is very promising. The Chief Commissioners from all States will be looking at their ideas to recruit Leaders and other members into your Groups at the next November meeting. I look forward to seeing what it entails and how we can implement the ideas so we can get more Leaders into our groups.

I have been working hard to find new non-uniform people for our Branch Executive Committee. I think I might have two, but we still need more, as most of our members at the moment are males - some females would give us a better balance. So if you know of someone who could spare us sometime once a month, call or email me.

I'm also looking for a way to get a good gift for our members who are invited by current members and who are invested into the Groups; this would be an addition to the Friendship badge. We have found that the best way to recruit new members is word of mouth from a very satisfied member, but for the member to be satisfied, our

Leaders must let the Youth do their own program, with the Adventure Begins and the new program coming. We hope this will occur very soon.

Safety boats are coming! Mike Patten has sent a letter to all Group Leaders asking for \$1200 each if they want to opt in. Isaac Smith has now found out that the operators need a VHF licence and he is willing to help with the training for this. This is on top of the operators having to do the boat operators course.

We have another two 1st Aid Courses on the go that will be up and running, one in Glenorchy (17 Leaders completed this) and the other in Devonport. I'm hoping to get another in Launceston and another in Hobart if this is required. Leaders must remember that they need a 1st Aid course to keep their Adventurous Activities Certificate.

The Message of Peace concept has reached 1 Billion hours worldwide, that is a fantastic achievement. The photo shows the places where some of the hours were conducted. Well done everyone.

We had a Wood Badge Course run a couple of weekends ago with about 11 Leader of Adults and 9 Rovers attending. As these two courses are very similar the course could be run together. As it is 100 years of the Wood Badge next year, we all hope that we get a lot more than 20 Leaders in the 100th year of the Wood Badge.



We are hoping to produce some supporter scarfs to give to Politicians,

Mayors etc. so they can display the scarf in their office. To get the ball rolling we will be making some plain scarfs with a Branch Badge on them, then hopefully by next year, there will be more people displaying Scouting scarfs on 1st August, Scarf Up Day.

Jeannette sent out a great email to the Group Leaders showing them how to broadcast emailing through MyScout, but unfortunately, some Groups are having trouble. If a Group has more than one Assistant Leader, the Assistants get the email several times, eg. If a Group has 3 Assistant Cub Leaders, all Assistant Cub Leaders get the message 3 times, something we have to look at.

Chief Commissioner's Report Cont'd

Great day for the Child Uni program at The Lea; we had 8 Youth who really enjoyed the day. Next time we might be able to get them on the flying fox. They had about an hour in the Heritage area and then up the top of The Lea where we had them doing compass work, making twister damper, lighting a fire, which was interesting as a lot of the Youth had never stuck a match before.

1st August was Scarf Up Day! How did your Group go? Did you get your Principal in a scarf? Did the Youth members go to school with their scarf on? I sent an email to all Leaders with some very interesting information in it for Scarf Up Day and other great material that you might like to use. I hope you found it useful.



Some time ago now, our Marketing Committee embarked on a mission to get a new profile/emblem for our Branch. At the time it was a great idea so I started a competition to get ideas. This has been put on hold as National has employed a marketing company to do this for all of Scouts Australia, which is a very sensible idea as we are all doing the same thing. At the last National meeting, the company who received the contract presented itself and told us of the things they have done, and the companies that they have worked for. Most of these companies are very large companies and some of the things that they have done are very impressive. They will be talking to all the Branches to get their ideas and at our next meeting in November they will present what they have come up with so far. One of the comments from one of the other members at the meeting was, "for the first time I am looking forward to this November meeting".

By the time you read this, I will be attending the 17th Japan National Jamboree until mid-August, along with a fellow Leader and five Scouts/Venturers from Leven District. Tassie Scouting has eclipsed National this time as we number nearly half the Australian Contingent.

As an IST (International Service Team) staff member, I am looking to working on their International Scout Centre team.

PADDY PALLIN AT PENNANT HILLS TRAINING CENTRE: I also visited this campsite in my travels last month when in Sydney. This was actually a bit of "deja Vu" for me, having been on the camp staff there as a Rover Scout back in the 1960's. This historic campsite was opened in 1929, visited by "B-P in 1931 and still hosts Scouting / civilian training. It may be of interest to readers to note that in their beautiful Chapel is a plaque commemorating former original scout, Paddy Pallin (of Paddy Pallin Outdoors Stores



fame). Paddy – whom I once met doing my Rover Ramblers badge in the Blue Mountains - become the first Rover Mate of the Baden-Powell Rover Crew. The chapel plaque has his epitaph stating "Never Truly Lost"! I recommend a visit to this historic scout venue whenever you have any 'down time' up in the Big Smoke, just ring the Camp Warden in advance.

TIME OUT: was socially undertaken by our team members on 23 June when we visited 'The Playhouse,' Hobart to view one of our own members in his role in the theatre. Stuart Nichols performed magnificently on stage in "Pride & Prejudice". He shone through, all thanks to his training gleaned from Hobart Gang Show.

GILWELL REUNION 2018: our museum was opened up to visitors from around the state and nationally, especially commented upon by Elston Hynd, AM, National Commissioner for Adult Training as guest. We displayed a series of nice campfire blankets for attendees; next year being the 100th Anniversary of Gilwell, we shall be undertaking an enhanced display for this special event.

HERE & THERE: Susan Gardner & I have co-opted with the Lindisfarne Histori-

Coming up is National Tree Day on 29th July - is your Mob and/or Group participating in this activity in your local area? My Group is! August is Scouts in Action month - this year's theme is 'Scientific Scouts in Action'. You shouldn't have any trouble coming up with heaps of ideas on this theme, and the Joey Scouts always love Science nights! As mentioned in my last report, a team of us from Tas attended the National Program Conference in Kyneton, Victoria at the end of June along with over 100 others from around Australia. Several different workshops were held on the Friday afternoon and these were quite interesting and provided good food for thought. As in previous years, the majority of the conference time was spent together on sessions on the Youth Program Review and the resulting new Youth Program. A lot of behind the scenes work on fleshing out the detail of individual components of the program and preparing the required resources have been done over recent months but overall the new program hasn't changed a great deal from what was shared at last year's YPR workshops.

We also had some section time during the conference weekend and it is always good to compare notes, share ideas and resources with the other Joey Scout Commissioners and make joint decisions about proposed changes in our section due to the introduction of the new program. Once again the topic of Joey Scouts camping was an important one on our agenda so we can have a National standard in place then individual Branches can add their own additional requirements as needed. Other topics discussed included the introduction of the Patrol System in our section and what is being trialled with this in different States so far, the commemorative book celebrating 25 years of Joeys (this project has been ongoing since 2016 - we're still waiting for a few Branches to get their information in but hopefully this will be completed soon!), and the introduction of 5 year olds and how this is going in each Branch. We'll be reviewing the 5 year old introduction over the coming months, and also looking at retention in our section and between the Joey and Cub Scout sections and what activities are held to encourage this, so if you have any comments on any of these topics, I'd love to hear them!

On the same weekend as the conference, Joey Scout Mobs in our Southern Region visited the Bonorong Wildlife Park. Although I haven't had any reports in person, from what was shared on our Tassie Joey Scout Leader Facebook pages it looks like the day was a big success with 73 people attending. Well done to the organisers! Planning is well underway for the Southern Region's Pirate Event in November too, and it is definitely looking like an event not to be missed - lucky Joey Scouts! The next planning meeting is scheduled for 26th August at 2.00pm.

At the end of June I joined the other Branch Commissioners for a weekend at the National Program Conference in regional Victoria. Branch Commissioners from each State/Territory in each Section were there to discuss Sectional matters and to learn about the New Programme. We learnt about the plans for the Challenge Areas, the Personal Progression Framework, outdoor adventure skills, special interest areas, and peak awards. We talked

about the elements that remain the same: SPICES, the Scouting Method, learning by doing, the Patrol System. More will be said at the Palaver and I'll share resources with you then. We're well placed for the changes that will come; there will be some differences — mostly in the badges and badge schemes — but nothing that we can't handle. A concentration on the basics (which haven't changed) is what it's about. Below are some pictures from the event. The first is the Tasmanian contingent, the others are 'action shots' from the event (which was part seminar, part 'pep-rally').





I would be pleased to hear from anyone who would like to be the first to take up the challenge and enrol in this qualification!




