

Chief Commissioner's Report

Where has the year gone? It only seems like the other day we were starting a New Year and now we are at the end. For the Scouts and Leaders going to the Jamboree, I do hope the weather is kind to you and that everyone has a fantastic time. I'm hoping to get there for a couple of days as I have a meeting on the 8th of January.

I have appointed a new Branch Commissioner Youth Empowerment, Justine McKeown. Justine will be a great asset to us and in time will hopefully get more of our Youth members involved in the running of the Branch. It's going to be a challenge for her but with the help of the other Branch Commissioners, we know she will succeed.

Early next year, we have three Branch positions that need filling, two DC positions - Clarence and Hellyer and the Branch Commissioner for Adult Support. If anyone wishes to have a look at what these positions entail, please send me an email and I will send you the position description.

Scouts Victoria and WA Uni have put together a great package (Leader Build) that might help us get more Leaders into our Groups, however, I need Leaders to run it. Victoria Branch will be training these Leaders to present the package. What the package entails is a set of Leaders doing presentations to parents in the Groups every two to three years to keep new Leaders coming into them. The presentation will be easy to run and with the help of the Groups in getting the parents to the meeting, we hope to increase the number of Leaders in each Group. However, without good presenters and these presenters willing to put in some time going to the Groups, it will fall in a heap.

Our PC Environment Commissioner Sam McGrath came to the Clarence City Council Seafarers Festivals and put on a great display on water bugs. It was a great PR event for Scouting and was very similar to the one that she put on at the Science weekend on the wharf.

The Joeys had a tremendous Southern Regional event on the Windeward Bound. They had so many Joeys waiting to go on it, that they had to make two trips. The Joey Leaders (with the help of some Rovers) also set up activities around the pier for the Joeys who weren't on the Windeward Bound. They then had a barbecue at the park near 10th Hobart's hall at Sandy Bay. The theme of course was 'Pirates' and the Joeys had a lot of fun. I did see a couple of Joeys who were apprehensive about getting on the tall ship but came back all smiles. What a great PR program, as a lot of people came up to them and asked who they were, and what they were doing. I was a bit surprised about the public asking who they were; it seems we need more of this type of event so the public get to know who we are.



Launceston West Tamar District did a vigil for the 100-year Remembrance Day (photos pages 6 & 7). What a great PR activity, organised by Steve Yam again. Looking at the Facebook page, most of the Youth came from Cressy, 4th Launceston, Tamar Groups and Rivallyn Venturers. They told me that the temperature got to below zero overnight which were challenging conditions for

them. At the service on the day, the Governor spoke to them, as well as some of the Government Ministers who attended the Longford RSL. At the Lenah Valley service, one of the Mt Stuart Scouts, Saskia Ferguson, did a reading, which came over very well- well done Saskia.

Over the weekend of the 10-11 November a Training Course was held for Pioneer Groups. The Groups that were involved were: Howrah, Kingston, Taroona, 4th Launceston, Leven Venturers, Tamar, Mt Stuart and NW Bay, eight groups and Formations in total. We had approx. 80 Leaders in the Training Hall and it was very squishy. Apart from the eight Groups, we also had the Training Team and the District Leaders from the Districts. There were two Leaders from the mainland, Emma and Clair who came down for the weekend to help answer any questions that the Leaders might have had and did some of the sessions for us. It was a big weekend and I think the Groups that have taken on this big challenge will get through it very well.

We all know a lot more about the New Program now and the Training Team and the Pioneer Groups feel a lot more comfort-

able knowing what the new program is all about and what they need to do. I must thank Greg Boon for the great effort he has put into the Change Manager position and getting the weekend to run as smoothly as it did. Thanks also go to Geraldine Harwood and Julie Creed for all their help and support to Greg, and on the Sunday, Ross Smith for doing a couple of the sessions and helping during the weekend.





We need to do this all again for the other 59 Formations in our state to hopefully get them all up and running with the New Program by the end of 2021. In January to early February (no date planned yet) the Training Team will do another course for the Rovers as they all want to be Pioneer Groups as well, which is great to see. Then the plan is to have the Pioneer Groups go for the next year with a review in June/July. We hopefully will start the training for the other Formations/Groups who want to have a go at the end of 2019 and begin in 2020. All the other Groups will be trained during 2020 and 2021. We hope to have all Groups up and running with the New Program by the end of 2021.

A big thanks to Craig Millsom and his team for putting on a very successful Rover Ball (Photos page 19). I heard there were approx. 115 Rovers, ex Rovers, Rover Advisers, ex-Rover Advisers and other Leaders who attended. The venue was excellent, the food was good, and the two musicians (who are trainee Rovers at the Eastern Shore Crew) were great. Talking to Craig, he is planning another one in 4 years for the 100 years of Rovers starting in Tasmania. It was a great night; the highlights were the stories that the Rovers and Rover Advisers told about some of the activities they have seen during their memorable time in Rovers. Congratulations to Alex Findlater who was presented with his Rover Service Award (certificate) for the excellent service he has given to the Rover section; Alex will receive the medal at the AGM. Well done Alex.

We have started our Member's Award process, asking Members to nominate another Leader for a Good Service Award. As usual, it has been a slow start running up to Christmas, it is a problem for everyone wanting to wind down. This is the last reminder that the Award Committee is still waiting on your Award applications; if you have a Leader/Committee member who should get an Award, please fill in the form and get it to BHQ very quickly, as we would like them in before the end of the year. The AGM will be in Latrobe next year on the 24th May so put this date in your diary.

It is great to hear that the George Town Scout Group is back and up running again, only with Cubs, but that is a good start. Thanks to Stephen Yam (DC Launceston/Tamar) for all the effort that he has put in.

We are hoping to get even more new Groups up and running next year as we need to get to 3000 members by the end of 2023. If you have any suggestions on where to start a new Group, please have a talk to your DC or myself and we will see what we can do.

Victoria Branch has done a survey to find if our Scouts have more resilience than the Youth who don't go to Scouts. What do you think the results were, yes, they do! We all know they do, but now Victoria Branch have the data to prove it.

A new logo has been approved; this logo will be launched on the 5th January 2019 just after the Jamboree Opening Ceremony. As the uniform will also have to be changed, National is going to produce a badge to go over the old logo - they are hoping that this badge will be less than \$2. The logo on uniforms from the Scout Shop will not be replaced until after June/July until stocks have been sold out, then the uniform will come with the new logo.

The year hasn't ended yet as there are so many activities that are going on during December, make sure you check your Group, District and Branch calendar, so you don't miss out. Some of the activities that I know about is an introduction to cycling at the Derwent Sea Scout Hall, State Venture, Sam McGrath Trees Bees and Seeds days and the Districts end of year functions, to name a few.

Have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and I will see you all next year. A big thank you to all the Leaders who have put so much time and effort into our Youth. You are making an enormous difference in our community by helping our children to become better citizens.

New Scout Program



After nearly 10 years of research, Australian and International, and extensive consultation in Australia, the New Scout Program has arrived. In June 2018, the program was formally approved and will be launched in 2019 at the Australian Jamboree. The Tasmanian Implementation Team includes Mike Hovington, Julie Creed, Geraldine Harwood, Ross Smith, Andrew Thompson and Greg Boon as Program Change Manager.

The new Program increases the focus on many Scouting fundamentals that BP considered so important and will more effectively assist Leaders achieve the Scout Purpose. There will be an increased focus on outdoor activities with many of the agerelated barriers placed in the current program removed. There will be an increased focus on Youth leading, Adult supporting, and both Youth and adult Leaders will be provided additional training to assist them determine when it is appropriate to direct, coach, support and delegate. Leaders will still be focused on ensuring that Scouts are competent and motivated prior to delegating to them. Leaders will also retain the responsibility to ensure that activities are being done safely, as our duty of care does not diminish just because we have a new program.

While the new program has been approved, there is considerable work been required to provide the necessary resources for Youth and Adult Leaders to utilise. The small team of people pulling together the necessary resources have done a fantastic job, with Tasmania Branch holding back on starting our Pioneer Groups until we were confident that there quality resources would be available for the Pioneer Groups.

By the time we get to the 2019 Regatta, you will start seeing Leaders wearing badges indicating that they are Pioneering the new Program. Youth members will be identifiable by the different selection of badges on their uniform.

We will take the time to learn from our Pioneer Groups before we role out the program further. As a result, the current boundaries in place, as written in TOP's will continue to apply. However, we will explore with the Pioneer Groups what changes will be required to allow the new program to be implemented. The Pioneer Groups will have a prior approval process for activities that they wish to conduct that are permitted under the new program (like camping for Joey Scouts) which is not permitted in the current version of TOP's.

For other Groups please be patient, as we need time to learn and determine what, if any, new boundaries we need to create that provides the right balance between permitting Adventurous, Fun, Inclusive and Challenging activities while ensuring that there is an appropriate level of risk management to ensure our activities meet appropriate safety standards.

Pioneer Group Training

On 10 and 11 November 2018 over 80 Section Leaders, District Leaders, Sectional Branch Commissioners and Trainers participated in Pioneer Group Training. We were very fortunate to have Clair Udy and Emma Watson, members of the National Program Support Team to provide valuable advice and support over the weekend and run many sessions.

Our Pioneer Groups are Kingston, Howrah, Mount Stuart and North West Bay in the South along with 4th Launceston and Tamar in the North and Leven District Venturers in the North West. We have 3 Sea Scout Groups and 3 land-based Scout Groups.

2019

The "Number One" priority for 2019 is to ensure that our Pioneer Groups receive the support and resources they need to be successful. These 7 Groups will, in 2020 and beyond be our Program experts. Plan, Do, Review is a core component of how we deliver our program and reviews of the new program implementation, which will occur in June and October 2019.

In early 2019 we will conduct Training for the Rover Section as all Tasmanian Rover Crews will be Pioneer Units trialling the Rover component of the New Program. This will provide Tasmania a unique opportunity to influence the program delivery for the Rover Section.

We will also focus on developing the knowledge and skills of our Training Team along with Branch and District Commissioners and Leaders so that in 2020 we can commence the roll out of the new Program to other Groups.

2020

In 2020, we will focus on transitioning Groups that are keen to adopt the new program. By then, we will have additional support resources available on-line. Groups will need to participate in a weekends training, in their local region. The Training will be offered during the day, with participants where ever possible be able to return home for the evening. Groups will be encouraged to attend this Training as a Group Leadership Team with Venturers and Scout Troop Leaders also encouraged to attend.

2021

In 2021 the focus will be on the remaining Scout Groups, assisting Leaders and Youth members successfully

transition across to the new program. Greg Boon Deputy Chief Commissioner

Joey Report



Here we are in the final few weeks of the 2018 Scouting year, with Christmas parades and Mob and Group break up events being held around the State. This last month has been quite a busy one for some with the Southern Regional Event, Pioneer Group Training, McHappy Day events as well as hopefully some interesting Mob excursions and/or outdoor activities to make the

most of the finer weather.

'Some 160 Joeys, Leaders and parents attended the Southern Regional "pirate themed" event on the 4th November. The outing was divided into two components - a sail on a "pirate ship"; and a hunt for pirates around the Hobart wharf area. The sail training ship "The Windeward Bound" was used as our pirate ship and involved two 1.5 hour trips. The Joeys were divided into two groups; while one group sailed on the Windeward Bound, the other Joeys searched for pirates around the wharf area. We placed pictures of pirates (10 in total) at various locations and the Joeys were given a sheet with cryptic clues to help find their pirates (we also provided them with a 'cheat sheet'). For each pirate found, the Joeys earned a piece of treasure. In their hunt for pirates the Joeys went with parents / Leaders in small groups. The crew on the Windeward Bound entered into the spirit of the outing by dressing up as pirates; and for a few Joeys who were nervous about being on board the ship, the crew helped to ease their concerns. The event ended with a BBQ at the park in Sandy Bay.'

From what I have heard, the Regional event was very successful and enjoyed by the Joey Scouts, Parents and Leaders alike! A big thank you goes to Lee Cowen, from Blackman's Bay, for the above report and for doing much of the organising of this special event. Thank you also to the Rovers and other Joey Leaders for all of your assistance and support too.

Pioneer Training (for Training Team members, BCs and all Leaders from the six Scout Groups who will be trialling the new program from the start of next year) was held over the weekend 9th-11th November. We have five Joey Scout Mobs that will be part of these trials, and it is really good to see how enthusiastic the Leaders from these Mobs are about introducing the various components of the new program into their Mob over the coming months. It is all very exciting and we'll follow their journey with great interest!

For the rest of us, the Adventure Begins information presentations will continue to be held in Groups around the State so please make every effort to attend when your Group's presentation is on. It is very important that every Mob works their way through the checklists provided as this is stage one of the implementation of the new program so we need to get this right in all Mobs.

As a result of the YPR there have been some changes to section age ranges. From **January 2019** all Sections in Tasmania will move to the age ranges now listed in P&R (National Policy & Rules) - for the Joey Scout Section it states 'The young person must have had their fifth birthday and be eligible for school prior to commencing in this Section' and 'Youth members are able to commence their progression to the Cub Scout Section at any time after their eighth birthday and will have completed their progression by their ninth birthday.' There is still some flexibility with this for any with special needs so please contact me with any questions regarding this anytime.

This month we congratulate Stella Hutcheon - Mt Stuart, Tom and Will Taylor - Taroona and Robert Morton - 1st Tamar on achieving their Promise Challenge Awards. Well done!

Finally I would like to take this opportunity to wish all Leaders and helpers a very Happy Christmas and holiday season.

Thank you to each of you for all of the effort you have put in again this year in providing a great program for the Joey Scouts.

I've just come back from this year's Clark Trophy camp. This is the state Scout camp and a marvellous weekend of challenge and fun for those in the Scout section. Your Cubs will love it when they move up and get there. But even better than Clark Trophy is the Cuboree!!! And next year is the 25th Tasmanian Cuboree!

The Cuboree is an all ages camp for Cubs and their Leaders. You and your Pack come and sleep in tents; we do all the cooking. The Cubs just spend a weekend having a great time with each other and with other Packs. Cuborees are so much fun in fact, that Cubs come from interstate and there's more than 500 Cubs on site for the weekend. Put it in your calendars and programmes now: October 11–13th 2019, at The Lea. There's even transport provided for those far away from Hobart.

As I said, this Cuboree will be the 25th Tasmanian Cuboree and we're planning for the best one ever! They don't just happen, however, and we'd love to hear from you if you can assist in a big or a small way. If we all did something small to help, it would really assist those who give up so much of their time just so others' kids have a great time. Please let me know if you'd like to help. We've had one meeting so far. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday December 12th from 7–9PM. It'll be on-line (and face-to-face at The Lea) so you can join in from home if you want! I'll email details to all CSLs and ACSLs.

Two weekends ago (at the time of writing anyway) I attended the Training weekend for the New Program Pioneers groups. The mechanics of the New Programme now seem to be stable and it looks good. The changes to the programme only apply to the Pioneer groups so for the 37 of you that aren't Pioneer groups, please stick to the old programme of boomerangs, achievement badges, and so on, with all the current Cub activities and safety arrangements as stipulated in TOPS. Please focus your programming, as usual, on the SPICES, the Patrol Method, empowering the kids to do more and contribute more. Please also hold Pack Councils to allow greater input on the programme by the kids.

One change that will apply to all from January 1st 2019, is that we'd now like the Pack Council to have greater involvement in determining whether badge requirements have been met, in signing them off, and in presenting them. One tangible indication of this change is that we'd like Pack Councils to recommend the awarding of the Grey Wolf award and Form 29 has been changed accordingly. It may take some time for the Pack Council to adjust to this role — if they're not doing it already — so please ensure you assist so that they're not making any requirements harder (or easier).

Another change from January 1st 2019 is the change to age ranges between the Sections as Tasmania will move to the new National ranges. Cubs will now need to be 11 before they are invested/moved up to Scouts, although they can link before their eleventh birthday. Similarly, at the 'other end', Joeys will need to be 8 before they are invested/moved up to Cubs, although, again, they can link before their eighth birthday. There will still be some discretion, so please contact me if you've any questions.



Please keep your requests for the Commissioner's Challenge badges coming. The year is almost over. I've received quite a few photographs of Packs completing the requirements. It's fantastic to see. Please keep them coming. Some of the photos I've received are below and on the next page.

*Undertaking "Hall Crawl 5", a Team visitation to Hobart Eastern Shore photographing former and present halls at Rosny LDS, Lindisfarne, 1st & 2nd Howrah, Geilston Bay, Clarence Sea Scouts. Photos of Northern Tas. Scout Halls, past &/or present, are welcomed direct to me by email anytime.

*Fred Koolhoff reinstated a 1960 memorial plaque dedicated to Padre J. Salter, Founder 2nd Moonah.

*Four additional boxes of items were received from ex-1st Zeehan group.

At the end of the camp 1^{st} Spreyton were awarded the Sir Ernest Clark Trophy flag for winning the points competition. Congratulations 1^{st} Spreyton on your superb performance. $1^{st}/2^{nd}$ Ulverstone were runners up, with Mt Stuart in 3^{rd} place.

It was noted that Patrols might in their planning over the next 12 months consider attending other District events where competition camps are taking place. DSLs and District Mindaris can please advise when they plan to have their District Camps. This is a possible opportunity for Troops to strengthen their skills and have fun with Scouts from outside of their district.

The planning of how a patrol approaches events like Clark Trophy is important in the lead up to the event. Troop/Patrol Councils may like to think about how to develop their programmes in the months leading to events like District Camp, Mariners and Clark Trophy. Maybe a topic for discussion with Scouts at your next District **Mindari?** If you had any thoughts on how Clark Trophy can be improved and didn't hand in a review sheet please don't hesitate to send me your thoughts.

Australian Scout Medallions - Nyah Inglis and Henry Burnett both Mount Stuart Scout Troop (photos on page 9) were proudly awarded their Australian Scout Medallions at the closing parade of Clark Trophy. Congratulations Nyah and Henry on achieving the peak award for the Scout section. Reminder to all Leaders to send ASM applications to BC Scouts not to BHQ.

Pioneering Groups - The rollout of Pioneering Groups will start in early 2019. I attended the Branch Training weekend which brought together the Tasmanian groups trialling the new program. This is a very important and exciting time for Scouts and I am really keen to work with Groups as they understand how the revised approach to Scouting for the 21st Century in Australia will work. Many have commented that there is a lot that is very similar to what we are already doing and that is correct. The new program is very consistent with what we do already. But, it also introduces important new components that will improve what we do. We are on a journey and it is going to occasionally be challenging, but it wouldn't be Scouting otherwise. The goal is to help ensure we are relevant into the future so we have a better chance to grow our membership.

National Section Age Changes - The guidelines for each section age range is being adjusted Nationally from January 2019 so that Scouts will ideally have had their 11th birthday before joining Scouts and are to be 15 years of age before joining Venturers. It is important to note that these are recommendations and there is group council discretion when considering when a Scout moves to their next section; the best interests of the child's development is of paramount importance.

Armistice Vigil - 4th Launceston and Cressy Scouts (photos on pages 6 & 7) participated in the Vigil held at Longford on the 11 November. This was a significant event as the Scouts were involved together with the cadets which I understand is the first time this has happened. Well done to all involved in the marking of the centenary of the Armistice.

When did your patrol last review its code of conduct? - We introduced a number of new point to point activities at Clark Trophy, one being on Bullying which is an important component of the award scheme. In reviewing the material at

breakingthecycle.scouts.com.au I was reminded there are some great resources available on how to deal with difficult issues with our Troops. Codes of Conduct are promoted and need to be updated on a regular basis by Patrols at the very least annually. The following 4 questions: What happened? + Who was hurt? + How does everyone feel? + How can we fix it? These prompts might be helpful in a restorative process and might be applied by your patrol councils when resolving matters around bullying or other behavioural issues. DPAC Grants Sport and Recreation

The State Government's Minor Grants Sport and Recreation will open on 23 January 2019.

Tasmanian Scout Planning World Record Attempt for Youth Suicide Prevention

Tasmanian Venturer Scout, Bob Bramley, is preparing for his world record trip that will see him become the youngest person to circumnavigate Australia solo by plane.

Setting off in January 2019, Bob Bramley, 16, will use his world record attempt to raise awareness about Youth suicide prevention by working in partnership with **Beyondblue**. After almost losing two very close friends to Youth suicide and depression in 2017, Bob's motivated to help spread the message about positive mental health right around the country. **"Youth suicide prevention is an issue very close to my heart. A lot of people are afraid to talk about suicide and depression and don't know what to do or who to turn to,"** Bob said while preparing for his journey. **"Talking to your friends and family and asking them if they are okay can make a huge difference."**

The world record attempt will take him on a 13,000 kilometre journey to 30 communities across Australia. His flight, dubbed 'Surviving Turbulence', will start from Devonport Airport in January 2019, with the trip expected to take three weeks.

His flight was made possible through a generous \$15,000 donation from Westpac and all funds not needed for the journey will be donated to **Beyondblue**. Bob gives a further big "thank you" to other Surviving Turbulence supporters including Elders, Woolworths, Bunnings Warehouse, Elphinstone Group, OzRunways, Xpress Signs and Tasmanian Clothing Company. He also thanked his friend and Hobart pilot Oliver O'Halloran, who set the record for circumnavigating Australia solo and unassisted in 2017.

Suicide is the leading cause of death for Australians aged 15 to 44 and accounted for more than a third of deaths for people aged 15 to 24, according to a 2018 report by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. As the Tasmanian State Coordinator for Scout Air Activities, Bob's passion for aviation is strong. **Bob developed the first Aviation Training Program for Scouts in Tasmania**, helping to "show that we're not all about the traditional Scouting activities. We're trying to branch out and seek new ways of having adventures."


