Chief Commissioner's Report



I have three new Project Commissioners to announce this month. Matthew Anderson is now our Project Commissioner for Risk Management and Emily Ezzy is now our Project Commissioner for Diversity and Inclusion, also Michael Sweeney is taking on the Assistant Project Commissioner of Radio role. We also

have a new Assistant District Commissioner in Launceston/Tamar Bec Edson. Ross Smith is taking on the Assistant Training and Development Commissioner role and Murat Djakic is taking on the Assistant Commissioner for VET. We welcome them all to the Commissioners Team. I'm still looking for a Branch Commissioner for Venturers, if you are interested, email me.

Friend finder torches are still going strong. At the moment I've given out 206 torches, 17 to Joeys, 111 to Cubs, 71 to Scouts and 7 to Venturers. Hopefully, I will have enough to get to the end of the year; if not, I will get some more.

Northern Area Rover Crew (NARC) tell me Carr Villa is back up and running again. Just in time for winter camping, so if you are interested, contact NARC.

There has been some discussion about the long sleeve activity shirt being part of the uniform, as per the last Newsletter. The Section Branch Commissioners have been talking to their Leaders, asking if they want this to happen. We are getting a lot of different answers, depending on the Section. The biggest problem is the long sleeve shirt only comes in blue, which is a problem for the older Units. How do we tell the Youth apart from adults — the younger Sections like the colours as the Leaders can tell them apart at large events. Discussions will continue.

VET Certificates are available for Youth members, to the point, if a Venturer, for example, gets their Queen's Scout Award, they get 30 points toward their TCE. VET Certificates get more TCE points as well, so it is worthwhile to look into these VET Courses.

I have modified the TOP 13 - New Youth form to include Youth Helpers, so if you want to have a Youth Helper help in your Section you can use this form now. If the Youth is already an older Scout or Venturer, then send an email to Lori at BHQ, and she can put that member down as a Youth Helper. This will help the Training Team to see if they need to run a Youth Helper Course.

We now have a short description of the Adventurous Activity Courses in the MyScout Calendar for the Leaders who don't know what the Course is about and want to learn more. Hopefully, this will give our Leaders a better understanding of the Course before putting their hand up to go on these Courses.

Gang Show International will run again this year over the JOTA/JOTI weekend. Last year was a great success, so they are giving it another go this year. Our Tasmanian Gang Show will run this year as usual with a bit of luck. Still, they need people to help, so if you are interested, contact Denice Walters.

Unfortunately, our Queen's Scouts and BP Awardees will not be able to be presented at Government House this year, as COVID has restricted the numbers at Government House to only 50 people. As we have nearly 30 Awardees this year, having it at Government House only allows one person per Awardee to attend. So we have found another venue thanks to our Branch Manager Maria. The venue is near the Shot Tower, Glen Albyn Estate, and the Governor will still be presenting the Awards.

Unfortunately, the Australian Jamboree is not going ahead, either in 2022 or 2023. Therefore, the Branch Scout Council is planning an all Scouts 5-day camp, starting on the 28th of December at Fulton Park. I'm looking forward to seeing most of the Scouts there.

For the Sections and Groups starting with the new program, don't forget you can get a lot of information from the website 'pr.scouts.com.au'. A lot of Leaders are having trouble with the new program app 'Terrain'. All the BC's and the Training Team are looking at getting help for you. We have some Leaders working with it and enjoying it, so we are hoping they can help and get everyone up to speed. Terrain Champion is Alistair Luckman — alistair.luckman@tas.scouts.com.au

Our Project Commissioner for Mental Health, Ian Hart, is working on applying for a Grant to Train a couple of Leaders to become Mental Health Trainers. They, in turn, will Train Leaders in our Groups. It would be great to have a Mental Health Leader in every Group as it is becoming a challenge for many Youth and some Leaders. With a lot of luck, we will get the Grant and get Leaders trained.

Staying on the subject of Grants. Our Project Commissioner for Grants has had some problems with Leaders, who think she has a magic wand and can get all the Grants we apply for. Gabby can only help you with the words; she has no influences on the companies giving the Grants out. Since COVID, it has been even harder to get Grants as more Groups apply for them.

Groups should get back to fundraising again; The work is then distributed through the group instead of on one or two people. The Group becomes a better Group as the parents socialise and become a family while working together. This, in turn gets more Leaders, more Youth and so on, a win-win situation. So, if your Group only needs a kayak, tent or something small, fundraise for it. It's a great experience for your Group.

With the exception of visiting other Districts, the form has nothing to do with proximity to your Hall, it is all about the activities. If you don't do the paperwork, insurance may be void and you expose yourself to potential financial damage and the organisation to reputational risk.




Special Interest Areas Cont'd

This allows you (and/or the Youth member) to think through what kind of challenges they're interested in, what they could do, and the help they would need.



Outdoor Adventure Skills Report

Welcome to the first update on OAS. Through this Newsletter it is hoped to outline some of the finer points of Outdoor Adventure Skills. Two aspect I would like to outline in this report is in relation to 1st Aid and the use of sit on tops boats.

As a requirement of Youth members to obtain their Peak Award a 1st Aid qualification is required. For anyone under 14 this is only required to be the skill set, as no organisation will award a qualification to under 14-year old's. The good news is Courses are being rolled out over the next 12 months in regions through Trainers connected with H&A Training based out of Newcastle. Already the 1st Course has just finished in the North, more will be advertised in other regions over the next few months. The cost of Courses will be less than \$50 for Youth and adult members. It is also planned to run a remote area 1st Aid later in the year. When and where the next courses are to be conducted will be advertised in the Next newsletter.

The second point for this Newsletter is in relation to sit on top kayaks. Although useful for a fun time at the beach or at a lake, it is not recommended they are used to teach canoeing skills relating to OAS. The skills required for these craft are completely different for those used in a sit in kayak or canoe. The training undertaken at a Branch day will also be completed in sit-ins and not sit-on. **Murat Djakic - Training Team**

Email reminders - mandatory eLearning

Just a reminder to check your junk email in case the early reminders for completion of the mandatory eLearning modules has slipped through into junk and you miss completing the units on time. If

the units are not completed within the 12 week period your membership will be suspended until such time as they are completed. The two mandatory units are SP Child Safe and SP Work Health and Safety, and they are required to be undertaken every three years, along with your Police Check and renewal of your Working With Vulnerable Peoples Card. This is part of Scouts Australia response to being a Child Safe organisation.

Scouting Adventure

It was disappointing to cancel the March Scouting Adventure weekend, but with only 5 participants it is not viable to run. The next Course is 19th-20th June, so please ensure your TOP 7 is sent to Branch at least three weeks before the Course. For new Leaders your Certificate of Adult Leadership cannot be issued until completion of the Scouting Adventure weekend. As a reminder for existing Joey Leaders, it is essential you either complete this weekend or have at least one Leader who has completed this weekend in order to take Youth members camping.

We are hoping for a bumper weekend for Scouting Essentials in May. Please ensure all new Leaders have been advised of the dates for face-to-face Training and all Training Application forms (TOP 7) are registered at Branch at least three weeks before the Course so we can ensure the appropriate number of Trainers and Catering.

Gang Show Report

Hobart Gang Show has been a bit busy the past couple of weeks. A team of 8 participated in the Hobart Relay for Life ... raising money for the Cancer Council.
