Maria Direen, Lori Jack and Mike Wilson for their organisation of the event. Also, thanks to Phil Harper and Greg Boon for reading the citations and our new Vice-Chair Griffin Blizzard, who also had a large part in the proceedings. Thanks also to Jan Tuxworth for taking over for Jonathan Pyefinch in announcing the Australian Scouts Medallions. Well done to all Good Service and Long Service Awardees. (photos page 2). This year's Awardees, if you would like to read your citation, it is in your MyScout file. Hopefully, everyone can login to their account and see it.

I had my last Queen's Scout (QS) and Baden-Powell (BP) Award Presentation on May 21. It was also our Governors (our Chief Scouts) final presentation for us. At the end of the presentation, we presented the Governor with some flowers, mostly native, and a small gift to Richard Warner, Kate Warner's (Governor) husband. We thanked them for all the work both of them have done over the last six years. Our new Governor (Barbara Baker) will take over the Governor role on June 9, and we welcome her.

Again, Emily Ezzy stepped up for us and was the MC for the QS & BP Presentations. As always, did a fantastic job; thank you, Emily, for stepping in on the short notice. Thanks to Maria Direen, our Office Manager, for finding a great venue as we couldn't have it at Government House, as it only holds 50 people because of COVID. So, the running sheet had to be re-written; thanks, Maria. Also, it was well done to the 9 QS and 7 BP Awardees. It takes a lot of time and effort to achieve a QS or BP Award. Unfortunately, 2 QS Awardees couldn't make the presentations.

Volunteer Week (17-23 May 2021), thank you all for putting in so much time to Scouts. Our Youth and our Community as a whole benefit because of your commitment to our Organisation. I sent all Leaders and Committee members, who are in our database, a Thank You certificate. If you didn't receive one, please check your email address in MyScout to make sure it is correct. I did have several emails addresses bounced back, so email me if you would like a certificate. I know of a couple of Groups who are printing them out and getting the Youth to present the certificate to the Leaders and Committee members. I thought that was a lovely idea, and I encourage more Groups to do this. Our Leaders are our greatest asset.

We need more Regatta Committee members to help with the Regatta. The two most required are a Vice-Chair and Pacer Coordinator, so if there is anyone who would like to give it a go, please contact me. Staying with the Regatta, I heard Targa Tasmania might be run over the March long weekend, giving us more headaches as many of our Leaders help with this event. Fingers crossed we can run it next year.

This year is the 80th year of Air Scouts. Starting in 1941 during the second World War (in England), Air Scouts was a large part of our Organisation. Sadly, Tasmania hasn't had Air Scout Groups for a while now. The last Group that I know of was the Llanherne Group who started in 1950. We also had a Group in the North at Western Junction Aerodrome. Just another part of history, unfortunately.

While I was in Brisbane, I visited Queensland BHQ, and it was interesting to hear that the office they are in was the site of a Mounted Group (horse riding). I didn't know we had Mounted Scouts in Australia. One of the Leaders who was a part of the Group just retired as the National President, John Pearn. John is a Professor at the Children's Hospital in Brisbane, and as you would expect, an ex-Leader. A charming person.

I have given 38 more Friend Finder torches out in the last couple of months. Our BEC (Branch Executive Committee) is looking into ending the torches by the end of November this year. It seems it isn't helping with our numbers, as our numbers are only slightly going up, and our retention rates are low. I'm not sure what we can do to increase our retention rate. Other States are finding a significant increase in their numbers, mainly in the Joey and Cub Sections. Our Joey number has increased, but our Cub Section hasn't yet; hopefully, they will in the coming months.

By the time you get this Newsletter. Our Training Team would have presented their first training weekend away from The Lea in a long time. Our Leader Build project has been so successful in the North West, the Trainers decided it would be good to get these new Leaders trained in their local area, at Fulton Park. Staying with training, we have six new Trainers doing their National Trainers training, 41 Nationally, the largest so far. This is because it's been 3 to 4 years since the last training Course was run. With the changing of the Youth Award Scheme and then COVID, the training has been put on hold. The training will be conducted over several 2-hour online sessions, ending with a weekend of face-to-face training in Victoria, instead of the long Easter face-to-face Course.

National has appointed a Deputy General Manager, Neil Carey; his Appointment will commence on the 17 May 2021. His background is in the IT sector, Business Analyst and Project Manager fields; he is also the GL at 1st Boronia Scout Group.

In closing, I would like to congratulate our Treasurer, Stuart Morse, who became a father again on May 11 to another baby boy. We hope to see him in Joey Scouts in a few years!

Joey Report





Cuboree


The Cuboree is a Leader (and parent) supported three-day camp held at The Lea from October 8th–10th. The theme for this year's Cuboree (the 26th) is "Fun from A to Z" and will contain lots of exciting activities for Cubs that will be fun and adventurous. It's open to all Cubs (and Cub-aged Guides) and we will need each Group to have a Scout stay over too. Transport is arranged for the Units beyond the Southern Region.

Early bird registrations are now open for Cuboree and a 10% discount applies until July 2nd. The fee for Cubs is \$85 and for Leaders is \$76 (and these rise to \$95 and \$85 respectively). The full registration fee is unchanged from 2019 despite increases in costs and additional costs to ensure COVID-19 safety. This camp is extremely good value for a fully-catered weekend including travel for the Northern and North Western Groups. A full refund will be provided if we need to cancel due to COVID-19.

Registration is via **MyScout**. When you login to MyScout, the event should be visible. When I login, my home screen looks like this:

The second (green) section shows the Cuboree event. Zooming in, you can see:





There are two links. The one on the left allows you to register those from your Unit who are attending, while the link on the right allows you to register yourself or one other person. Invoices will be sent automatically and we'd like a single payment per Group if possible please.

If you have any difficulties or questions, please contact Adrian, our Registrar, via **cuboree.registrations@scouts.tas.com.au**Leaders who assist with organising the Cuboree don't have to pay registration. And coincidentally, we need more volunteers. Commissioner's Challenge

Get Outside and Cub!

Cubs are required to:

- Lead/Assist in running an outdoor activity
- Participate (or Lead or Assist) in at least four outdoor activities
 - * One with their Patrol (or additional Cubs)
 - * One with their Unit (or additional Units)
 - * One with the Section(s) of their Group (or additional Groups)
 - * One with other Units from their District (or additional Districts)
- Complete Stage 2 (or higher) in any three Outdoor Adventure Skills streams or complete the Section 4 (Outdoor Scouting) requirements of the Bronze/Silver/Gold Boomerang

SIAs are required for Peak Awards in every Section. SIAs allow the Youth to explore areas beyond Scouting. And, SIAs are individualised — every project's goals are negotiated to challenge the individual.

Unfortunately, I'm starting to hear stories of Leaders setting unrealistic requirements which are beyond those agreed by the Unit Council. The time requirements are as follows:

Joeys: 2 hours
Cubs: 4 hours
Scouts: 8 hours
Venturers: 12 hours
Rovers: 18 hours.

The Plan component only needs to develop the Youth's knowledge/skill in an area over that time frame. There is no requirement to have professional quality outputs, and professionals should not be required to verify the achievement. We are not awarding degrees! We are developing our Youth. If you or anyone else have questions, or feel that the requirements have been set too high, please contact us!

Finally, a reminder that **pr.scouts.com.au** has many tools to assist you and your Youth plan, document, and review their SIAs. Looking in the Achievement Pathways section reveals:

National Up-Date

All Leaders are now able access **pr.scouts.com.au** for information on the 'new' Youth Program and for many answers to your Terrain questions.

SP-Child, one of the two mandatory eLearning units which requires renewing every three years, has itself been up-dated.

eLearning – all the old Sectional units will be archived from May, with new units being added, including Managing Behaviours and Being Inclusive.

We are looking for video content for Youth Empowerment and Making Patrols Work modules, so if you have anything that would fit these modules please get in touch as soon as possible – your Youth members could become stars!

We are hopeful the Leader of Adult Management eLearning will go live in June.

New Personal Development Courses (to replace the previous Youth Leadership Courses) should be available by the end of the year. This will include all Youth members from Joey Scouts through to Rover Scouts. The content is being worked through with Monash University. Please be aware all current Courses will still be recognised for any Peak Award requirements.

There is development and progress on a 'Connection to Country' Award to be released Nationally. This will sit alongside the 'Their service, Our heritage' Badge.

We are very keen that Leaders continue to work with Terrain. If you are using any other system of your own design you MUST be aware of the requirements of the Privacy Policy and the possibility of data breaches, and how this will be managed.

While visiting the South of the State earlier in May, I took the opportunity to visit the Cygnet Scout Hall following an invitation from Michael Sweeney. Mike was going to be at the Hall that evening running an Amateur Radio Foundation Licence Course and it was a good opportunity for me to present some Licence Badges. The 2 new operators are Thomas VK7LOL and Coen VK7CAG, who both passed the exams while under 15 (photos below). They also both received handheld radios which were donated by local amateurs to help foster an interest in amateur radio by local Youth. Licensed Scouts in the Huonville Group have also received handheld radios from the same source.

Students attending the current Course were, 6 Scouts and 1 Venturer from Cygnet and 2 Scouts from Huonville. Demographics are 7 boys and 2 girls aged 11 to 17 years old.

When they have completed the training and passed the examination as required by the Australian Communications and Media Authority they will be able to join Lakia VK7LBJ, Christian VK7CMD, Robbie VK7MPR and Billy VK7BSR from Huonville on the air.

The Huonville Scouts recently helped at a horse endurance ride near Oatlands and are already planning on helping run JOTA stations later in the year. They have also been invited to participate in the Australian Ladies Amateur Radio Association contest as licenced operators.

Also during the last month, there has been equipment upgrades and repairs carried out at the VK7SDL station at Ulverstone Scout Hall and also at the Paton Park station. Included were a new antenna, dual band radio and power supply donated by local amateurs. This work is thanks to Eric VK7EV, Matt VK7ML, and Ross VK7WP from the North West Tasmania Radio & TV Group, with the assistance of Stuart, Scouts District Commissioner for Leven. So that is another Scout Hall ready for Jamboree on the Air and indeed for use by any licenced Scouts in the Group.

Duke of Edinburgh

It is with great sadness that The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award - Australia acknowledges the death of our Founder, HRH The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh KG KT AK. You may be interested in knowing a little bit about the Award he created.

Prince Philip was the founder of the Duke of Edinburgh's International Award, first established in the United Kingdom in 1956. The Award was intended to support young people on their journey of self-development, regardless of their background, culture, physical ability, skills or interest, as they find their purpose, passion and place in the world. The purpose and principles are perhaps best explained by His Royal Highness.

"Young people growing up in this modern and complicated world have many difficulties to face, and opportunities for personal achievement are often limited. At the same time, parents, teachers, voluntary organisation leaders and employers who recognise their responsibilities towards young people also have their challenges. The Award is intended to help both the young as well as those who are concerned for their welfare. The object is to provide an introduction to worthwhile leisure activities and voluntary service, as a challenge to the individual to discover the satisfaction of achievement, and as a guide those people and organisations who would like to encourage the development of their young fellow citizens."

Six decades later and millions of young people have been inspired to transform their lives and discover what they are truly capable of achieving - More than 5.5 million Awards have been gained in 160 Countries and Territories. Right now, more than one million young people are striving to achieve their Bronze, Silver, or Gold Awards in more than 130 Countries and Territories. In Australia we currently have over 45,000 active Award Participants supported by Nearly 60,000 volunteers. Prince Philip's fervent hope was that:

"Everyone who takes part in the Award will find an added purpose and pleasure to their lives. I am quite sure that all those who help to run it will gain that special sense of satisfaction which comes from helping others to discover hidden abilities and overcome a challenge."

During Prince Philips 21 visits to Australia, he engaged in activities to recognise and promote the Award during 18 of these visits. In 1963 he presented the first Gold Award Certificate to Michael Dillon (now Michael Dillon AM, world renown film maker, including accompanying Sir Edmund Hilary of numerous trips to Nepal and Everest). In 1973 he made an extended tour visiting Award Centres and presenting Gold Awards in 19 cities: Townsville, Rockhampton, Maryborough, Brisbane, Toowoomba, Lismore, Williamtown, Bathurst, Dubbo, Sydney, Wagga Wagga, Sale, Melbourne, Launceston, Hobart, Adelaide, Mt Gambier, Albany and Perth.

Prince Philip gave everything to this Award to ensure that young people had a chance to achieve something great. The Award Internationally will be recognising what would have been Our Founders 100th birthday with a series of events including a Founder's 100 Challenge and a Wear The Badge Day on the 10th June (Award Badge), I will advise more about this event as it becomes known.

This sad time is a great reminder of an Award that is available to all Scout, Venuters and Rovers aged 14-24, if you would like any more information about this Award or would like to know how to get involved feel free to contact me.


International Report

Heritage Report

THERE IS A MOUSE IN THE REFRECTORY (KITCHEN) AT THE LEA.

But it's already been caught, sorry. Long story short, we were graced by Rolf Shankley recently, son of Bill Shankley. Bill Shankley created the worlds first Woggle for Baden-Powell himself and it now resides in our museum. Rolf is also an expert wood carver and was delighted to see 'Our Possum' carved by his father, still

above the entrance door to HQ at The Lea. He also pointed out the carved Mouse under one of the Refrectory tables, still there. Rolf informed us his Father, Bill Shankley was cremated and his ashes are spread around The Lea Chapel in the lower portion Kingston corner side, a revered spot.

Scouts were there too! Research has shown up to 150 Boy Scouts with Leaders - at least 15 of whom were Tasmanians - attended along with many dignitaries, public, etc. on this historic occasion in May 1927, just 94 years ago this month. A Scout Leader was the Chaplain/D.C. William Thomas from 1st Burnie.

A team effort, we have commemorated this event with a Leaders mannequin in period Scouter uniform. He has his scarf made by Susan Gardner, painted frame by Fred Koolhof, 1910's Scout silver buttons & scarf badge by Tony Peck, even a blackwood woggle with silver badged Tasmania map courtesy Rolf Shankley. Another project completed to view on your next visit to us.

VISITORS have continued to stream into our Heritage Centre on a seemingly continual basis of late.

Early March, we hosted the Guides Heritage Team at our annual cross-exchange day with respective memorabilia's obtained over the past year; Former Queen's Scout 1st Devonport, Ken Dawes visited us. [In 1968 Ken was an Awardee of a Scout Gallantry Medal for Meritorious Conduct rescuing a Scout from drowning at Fulton Park.] Ken presented us with a copy of his Certificate; Ken is still involved with the Tasmanian Snowfields Museum, including providing a photo copy to us of 1937 Tasmanian Scouts in the Snow at Ben Lomond, an additive into our 2021 year theme of "Scouts can do anything". Former Scouting and Guiding personnel continue to "just drop in" and share valuable information to us, whilst contributing personal items.

SCOUTING HERITAGE TRAILS at the request of Scott, The Lea Caretaker, were trekked outdoors recently by members from our Heritage Team to re-establish them. Having been 'slightly' overgrown in places, tracks are being repaired for the use of future The Lea users, including hiring to School groups, organisations and others with an interest in outdoors educations.

A COMMEMORATIVE SERVICE was held at Geeveston, 16 April for our esteemed member, the Late Dr Dick Geeves. Needless to say, the Church was packed to overflowing, including some of our Heritage Team and The Lea Service Crew. Dicks' family attended from Sydney. The welcome legacy is that one of his sons will take up residency in Dicks' house, continuing the family lineage in this historic town.

ANNUAL AWARDS to Team members stemming from the 2021 AGM were acknowledged/presented to Lyn Harvey - 25 Years Service; Tony Peck - Silver Koala Award and Marion Blight - Silver Kangaroo.

CONTRIBUTIONS continue to pour in to enhance our Centre. Thanks to Lyn Harvey for several shelves; a massive 13 boxes received from 1st Cressy, including 1930's items of the Late Keith Chandler. Also Longford, Evandale & Perth contributions. The latter four towns now form the new Norfolk Plains Scout Group (combined, meeting at Perth). Thanks to Peter Dodd & Lloyd Chugg for their historic contributions. Robert Milnes from Ulverstone shone through with Northern Tasmanian scarves, newspaper reports 1983 North West Region camp, early 1945 Senior Scout Tasmanian history, also Group histories of 1st Turners Beach & 1st Preston. Royal Tours 1950's-1970's from Robert Gardner.
