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Chief Commissioner's Report

I have been working on renaming the Project Commissioners position/appointment; those who have done project management before would know a project has a start and a finish date. But most of our Project Commissioner positions are ongoing, which doesn't really make them "Project" Commissioners. So, what I have been suggesting is to put the name of the position first and then Commissioner or Manager. For example, the Project Commissioner for Leader Build would be Leader Build Commissioner. As most of these positions could also be done by people outside of Scouting, I have also made it possible to have Manager on the end, so the person wouldn't have to do any leadership training. So, for example, the Project Commissioner for Containers would be Container Manager, if a non-Leader person, or Container Commissioner if a Leader.

The Regatta Committee is going ahead with the Regatta providing we don't go into lockdown. A leaflet has been sent out to all parents of Scouts and Venturers, plus Rovers, and Leaders of these Sections. Entry Forms are on MyScout for Leaders to fill out. This year's registrations will be via MyScout, eliminating any Youth member who isn't on there the ability to register. Hence, Leaders, please make sure your Youth members are on our MyScout and registered.

The Cuboree will be in full swing on the 9 and 10 October; the committee has been working hard in the past 12 months. So, fingers crossed, touch wood and all those things that we don't have a lockdown before completing the camp.

For those Leaders who have been in our Movement for more than three years, we have rewritten the Reviews, called them Catchups, as they are not Reviews. As we recognise that the Leaders need help to give the Youth a great program. The Leaders can also pick the Leader of Adults who they wish to do the Catchup with, so if you prefer another LOA other than your Group Leader, you may choose your District Leader instead. We hope this works as we need Leaders to feel wanted and appreciated.

As most Leaders would have seen, I sent out an email a couple of weeks ago, asking Leaders for good hi-res photos. The Marketing Committee wants good hi-res activity photos to put on our web page, posters, and so on. We have several Port Arthur giveaways for the Leaders and parents who can provide us with good activity photos. Please make sure you have permission from the parents before you send them, as we don't want photos of Youth members we can't use.


Cuboree


Scouts Australia recognises the following values:

Adventurous Activities & Leader Training Report

Another month closer to Xmas and this month we have had a very successful 2nd weekend for white water rafting and I sitting here writing this wearily after four fantastic days on the Derby MTB 2021. Well done to Julian Varney and the Cycling Team. I am excited by the amount of different and the variety of AA we are currently offering our Youth and Leaders. As I have already mentioned, next year the cycling events will allow Leaders to gain training in the Cycling arena.

In October there are two Leader Training Courses (Scouting Essentials and Scouting Adventure) and a Basic Seamanship (Sailing and Rowing). Unfortunately the proposed Basic Abseiling at the end of October is being postponed to 9-10th April 2022. The Basic Abseiling will now return back to a 2 day Course to ensure the correct content is covered and have all trainees get the chance to abseil in both Natural and Artificial environments.

Shortly we will provide dates for Training Courses next year and as discussed in the last Newsletter we are hoping to run additional AA Courses for Leaders and Youth. I am interested in gauging interest in the following AA activities- Canoeing/Kayaking – Moving Water, Caving, Climbing, Sea Kayaking, Power Boat / PWC and Pioneering. There are other activities being considered that are included in the OAS and we would be interested to hear from anyone that is interested in being involved in any of the areas above as either a participant or assisting with training.

Some may have heard of a recent incident with Abseiling in NSW, the injured individual from the incident is recovering well and the investigation is completed. Scouts NSW have found many variations in the way their abseiling is run in the State and are running re-training sessions for all Abseiling/Vertical Leaders. Safework NSW are not pressing any charges in relation to this incident. Currently within Tasmania all our abseiling activities are run to higher minimal standards using best practice within incorporates a top-belay for abseiling and climbing activities.

Just to clarify all activities that we are currently running in Tasmania are subject to TOP's regulations and risk management requirements to ensure we meet our insurers guidelines and limitations.

As previously reported there has also been a donation of equipment again from local Amateur Radio operators. So all is ready for VK7SDL to be on the air from Leven District.

For those Scouting members in the Hobart area, thanks to the Radio and Electronics Association of Southern Tasmania Inc., there is the invitation to attend their open day on Sat 16th. This will be located at their clubrooms (old coastal radio station) at the top of the Domain. Suggested time between 10 am and 2 pm. This will enable members who cannot otherwise participate in JOTA, the opportunity to get on a radio and contact other Scouts. I hope to have badges available for \$2 on site or have a participation certificate available so your Leader will know you are eligible to receive a badge.

Queenstown Scouts also intend participating, but not from Cradle Mountain this year. The station at Rocherlea will be on air from noon until 6pm Saturday and 10 am to 3 pm Sunday. Activities will include hidden transmitter hunting, Skype and JOTI TV on the big screen. Look for JOTI.Launceston on Skype. Also on Echolink VK7KPC-L. Saturday the 28th of August saw the annual ALARA radio contest with 2021 seeing a new category

"Scouts & Guides" 2 girls & 4 boys operated for a 6-hour period between 4.00pm & 10.00 pm on Echolink & H.F. radios from their permanent radio shack at the Huonville Hall.

The contest is all about the "Ladies" of amateur radio, getting on-air to chat & try to gain points for contacts over a 24-hr period. One of a few rules sees the boys, or "OM" in radio terms, only able to gain points by speaking with the YL's (Ladies). Our 2 YL operators chose to use their own Foundation licences & managed to speak with an operator from the Netherlands!

It was a very hands-on experience for the 6 Scouts, giving them a personal challenge to operate the radios which included changed bands & modes of operation, organise & compile the log book entries, sending & receiving precise information all for their very first time!

Many comments were made on how focused all the operators were & envious of being able to participate not in lockdown. In total, a huge 31 stations where logged & it is hoped, the 2 call signs, VK7LJB & club station VK7HSD will hopefully be on the points board for 2021. What was gained from the experience? putting Tassie Scouts on the map, Fun & hopefully a certificate.

With JOTA coming up, Huon District are excited to see this years event a "Youth led, Adult supervised" event.
