Nigel Clutterbuck (our Branch President) persuaded a TV crew to attend and we had 9 minutes of good PR on the news on Sunday night. We were very lucky to have missed lockdown by just one weekend!

We have had a couple of visitors in the last couple of weeks to The Lea. The Kingborough Mayor and the Sport and Rec minister were impressed with what we are doing. Both didn't know The Lea was used so much by schools and other departments.

I was able to attend the Opening Ceremony and the investiture of our new Chief Scout new Governor Her Excellency the Honourable Barbara Walker. What a wonderful experience and I have to say Griffin Blizzard our Vice President and I were in awe of the ceremony and how well our Youth conducted themselves.

Our new Chief Scout didn't leave in a hurry and even went on the flying fox. Mike Hovington and myself walked the site for an hour or so after and had a great opportunity to see Guides/Cubs and all the other Sections having a great time. Big thanks and congratulations to all involved. Well done an absolute credit to you.

With recycling by now you may be aware that we have entered into a partnership with St Vinnies in relation to the impending containers deposit scheme. Even though the start date is a little while off we both wanted to start talking to our possible supporters. Why ST Vinnies ? St Vinnies have large suitable properties throughout the state as well as trucks, staff etc, Scouts have 50 locations and a huge community reach. Both organisations have valuable experience in other states we can call on.

Will Scout Groups still get there 10 cents per approved container? Yes. The arrangement will also allow Scouts Tas to gain an additional financial benefit by us supporting one organisation state-wide. This benefit will be over and above the 10 cents and will also apply to other organisations and community groups that through our reach support the ST Vinnies/ Scouts Tas partnership. This will overtime allow us to keep costs down and provide additional financial assistance state-wide. As time goes on more information will come to hand.

What I ask in the meantime, let's start talking within our local communities about how they can support Scouts by donating their recycling cans to Scouts once the deposit scheme is up and running

Cuboree






Commissioner's Challenge

Scouts is a fantastic extracurricular activity for all Youth (and adults) who are able to participate. A recent Flinders University study confirmed that outside school activities are highly beneficial to children beyond what school offers. The value to children who may experience levels of social disadvantage is particularly significant. There is evidence that children who are able to engage in activities like Scouting, develop confidence, have a higher sense of belonging to their community; and can improve their educational and lifelong outcomes. Often financial barriers prohibit participation. In Tasmania Ticket-to-Play offers a level of financial support for families to assist with meeting the cost of activities like Scouting. If your Group is unfamiliar with the Ticket-to-Play program it might be 'just the ticket' to help a child to embark on the great adventure that is Scouting. https://www.communities.tas.gov.au/ticket-to-play

It has been a busy time for Venturers over the last two months. There was the Teniswood Trophy, a number of outdoor adventure skills courses, the recent Scout Invasion and of course plenty of activities being run by Sections across the state.

Backing up a bit, I just wanted to congratulate the winning Team for Teniswood 2021, Leven Venturer Unit. An absolutely fantastic effort from a very determined group of Venturers. This year Teniswood was based on a lightweight hike / survival rogaining challenge. Participants were provided an equipment list containing very few items and a recipe for a survival bar (quite tasty), on arrival the teams registered and were sent off into the wilderness of Mt Cameron to survive the night. In the morning all teams returned to base camp and were given a list of grid references, a map, compass and a list of how many points each check point was worth. The teams were then required to navigate cross country (avoiding roads) and decide which checkpoints they should try to find. Overall, the activity was well received and the feedback I have gotten from the Venturers indicates that a similar format would be enjoyed in the future. Again, a huge thanks to Neil and Murat for putting this activity together.



Duke of Edinburgh

The Award is a leading structured youth development program, empowering all young Australians between age 14 to 25 to explore their full potential regardless of their location or circumstance. The Award is a fully inclusive program and has no social, political, or religious affiliations.

Each young person who takes part in the Award learns a skill, improves their physical well being, volunteers in their community and experiences a team adventure in a new environment. All Participants are supported by a network of adult Award Leaders, Assessors, Supervisors, and Mentors.

The Key elements of our program are:

- Open to all between the ages of 14 to 25.
- Three levels: Bronze, Silver, and Gold, each progressively more challenging.
- Four Sections: Physical Recreation, Skill, Service, Adventurous Journey

Achieving an Award recognises individual goal setting and self-improvement through persistence and achievement. Through this challenging journey of self-discovery, our Participants:

- Are equipped and empowered to achieve their personal best;
- Learn to take responsibility for their goals and choices;
- Become connected to and actively engaged within their immediate community;
- Make a real difference to society through their positive contributions and involvement;
- Learn to persevere and overcome barriers to success;
- Learn important life skills; and
- Increase their career opportunities.

Today more than 140 countries have adopted The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award program with over 8 million young people having participated worldwide. Locally over 700,000 young people have completed the Award in Australia in the past 57 years, with on average 40,000 very diverse participants annually working towards achieving an Award.

The Fundamentals of the Award

Regular participation in activities is required to meet the time requirements of each Award Section and Level.

Focuses on capacity building by encouraging all young Australians to make independent decisions and to negotiate priorities through participation.

Provides a framework that works with all young people in any conceivable situation. This includes youth at risk, Indigenous youth, new refugees, marginalised youth, young people in regional and remote communities, and young people with disabilities.

Assists with the provision of social infrastructure in the community and draws together and connects people, institutions and generations with the common purpose of youth development and inclusion.

The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is a global framework for non-formal education, which challenges young people find their purpose, passion and place in the world. The Award is open to young people aged 14 to 24, and is run in over 130 countries.

Are you part of a Scout Group in the electorate of Franklin? The office of your local Member of Parliament, the Hon. Julie Collins is now accepting expressions of interest for Round 7 of the Stronger Communities Programme.



This grant program aims to deliver social benefits to local communities with grants between \$2,500 and \$20,000 available to undertake projects in the Franklin electorate. The grant amount can be up to 100% of eligible project expenditure.

Expressions of Interest will be assessed by the electoral office, with the help of the Franklin Community Consultation Committee, and up to 20 projects will be nominated to be part of the Federal Government's grant round. The number of projects chosen will depend on the amount they ask for. A maximum of \$150,000 is available for the Franklin area.

Scouts Tasmania has a Project Commissioner for Grants — Gabby Brown, who can help provide advice to prepare your application. This round of EOIs are due to Ms Collins' office by 5:00pm Monday 29 November 2021, so get in touch to let me know you're preparing an application, and allow at least four days before this date to have your grant checked me. JOTA/JOTI

Well that was a different JOTA/JOTI, even more so than last year.

10th October, 1 week out and we had stations organised for Paton Park, Spreyton, Rocherlea, and Huonville, plus an invite to attend the radio club open day at the Domain in Hobart. Badges were on hand and supplies had been delivered to HQ for the southern stations, plus some were on the way

north for Spreyton and Ulverstone.

Monday morning I was informed the Spreyton operation had to be cancelled due to unforeseen circumstances, Slight change of plans saw Spreyton Joeys invited to attend Paton Park, so not a complete loss.

Then Friday afternoon while setting up the station at Rocherlea we heard rumours of a 3 day shut down in Hobart. By 2:45 this was confirmed as a shut down of the southern half of the state, so much for plans. Policy Statement

The Scout Association of Australia has a duty of care to all its members to provide a safe environment that protects them from harm when participating in its programs. All Adults are accountable to deliver that Duty of Care on behalf of the Association, at all times.

Policy: The policy of Scouts Australia is for individuals to follow the health guidance provided by governments (Federal/State and or Territory), including any Public Health Orders, and to seek medical advice as to their own particular circumstance to make an informed decision in relation to vaccination.

It is not the policy of Scouts Australia to exclude unvaccinated members from membership.

General. Scouts Australia and its State and Territory Branches aim to promote a general position of supporting government / medical authority led advocacy for vaccination, for members of Scouting in Australia and we see it as a public health benefit. Members who are not vaccinated may be at increased risk, particularly from highly contagious diseases

However, there are risks to be considered where some members are unvaccinated.

The Risk. In day to day scouting an unvaccinated member may present a risk to themselves and to others. They may be at an increased risk of contracting infectious disease with the potential to spread it to others. In the normal course of events a small percentage of vaccinated people will not be protected from the disease for which they were vaccinated against. Some other members may be vulnerable, as they may not be able to receive vaccinations due to medical conditions or be immune compromised.

For this reason, should an outbreak of an infectious disease occur, people who are unvaccinated may be excluded from contact with others by Public Health Officials, for the duration of the outbreak. Scouts Australia will always follow any specific Public Health Orders and adapt its program in accordance with that advice. Therefore, Scouts Australia will not allow exemptions to Public Health Orders or legislation.

Should such an outbreak occur at a camp or major event this may result in the return home of unvaccinated Scouts. This may incur additional cost for the Participant/Parent(s)/Guardian(s). Alternatively, it may see a member placed into isolation until the outbreak has passed. In some rare cases the special/complex medical conditions of a member may require a certain level of broader vaccination in others to be necessary. It is here that consideration needs to be given to prioritising the care of the majority of members who wish to safely practice Scouting. In these circumstances advice of the relevant Branch authorities must be sought before any requirement is advised.

Scouts are also at risk of infection from injury, such as tetanus and wound infection.

Participant/Parent(s)/Guardian(s) consent for medical attention is included in all forms for activities and includes treatment for injuries and infections. Scouts Australia strongly encourages all members to be up to date with all vaccinations they may be able to medically receive and to seek advice on the need for additional protection before any overseas travel.


