Dugald was one of those great Leaders who kept giving right to the end. Susanne and I had the pleasure of his company, before he

At the last GL Conference, one of our GL's wanted training for their Treasurer. The training is already there on the online system as per our Leaders' online training courses. As mentioned at the GL conference, we are in the process of getting all Groups onto Xero accounting. With every Group on the same accounting system, we can help each other with treasurer matters as we will be using the same approach—a win-win situation.

One of our GL's asked whether we can let Youth and parents use their own PFD for water activities. The short answer is yes, but they must be the current and up-to-date PDF version. Any old PFD's cannot be used; if any parent turns up with an old PFD, they must be told they cannot use them.

Heritage Report



Vale, Dugald McDougall 3.1.1929 – 18.2.2022 We lament the recent loss of our veteran Scouter and beloved friend, Dugald who has 'Gone Home.'

After 15 months on the Troops Waiting List, an enthusiastic young Dugald finally joined 1st Derwent Sea Scout Troop in February 1942, then, by 1947 was a King's Scout. He was their SL & GSL from 1956 to 1962. As a Rover, his highlight in 1951 was attending, as one of our few Tasmanians, the 7th World Scout Jamboree, in Austria. His first major trip prior was in 1948 to the 3rd Australian Jamboree, Yarra Brae, Vic.

His Scouting career, through continuous devotion and service, involved Sea Scouts as State Commissioner 1973 - 1982, later with the State Training Team, with BHQ appointments and many Scouting positions. Dugald put in endless pioneer years at The Lea Scout campsite, including stalwart service with The Lea Service Crew. His dedication never ceased, with a finale at the 25th Australian Jamboree, Tailem Bend, SA in 2019, attaining a record as the oldest active Scout present, then aged still 90 years young. In between years, Dugald also served with the Australian Navy Reserve in Tasmania as a Lieutenant Commander, 1949 to 1972, in addition being a most devoted family man. With 80 years Scouting service, we will remember him proudly and endeavor to keep up to his standards.

Theme 2022

This year we are honouring, on our transparent table display, former Tasmanian Scouting personnel who have achieved a high profile in their career and public lives. Moreover, persons who became ACHIEVERS, thanks to scouting. A person who springs to mind is Wes Ford, Queens Scout, 1st Lindisfarne, now Director of Environmental Protection Agency, Tasmania. If any reader has an ex- "Scout" from their Scout Group who has achieved a notary position, ever since their Groups formation, I would like to hear from you. Another example is, recently I was contacted by the daughter of Sir Max Bingham (former Deputy Premier, Tasmania) who forwarded her fathers 1940's shirt (King's Scout, 10th Hobart) now in our Scout shirt exhibition. As our list grows larger, we hope to publish further – any significant outcome, due to initially Scouting, is what we are seeking. Names, with a photo, please.

Scout Cycling

Jamboree on Pedals (JOP)

What and when is Jamboree on Pedals?

Held in March each year, Jamboree on Pedals (JOP) is an annual event to encourage all Scouts to undertake cycling adventures. It is based on the model used for JOTT, JOTA & JOTI, hence the similar name.



How does it work and who can participate?

All Scouts, of every age and location, are encouraged to plan, assist and/or participate in a cycling adventure in March. There is no one central event, rather lots of Patrols, Project Patrols, sections, and Groups all undertaking their own cycling adventures. There are no minimum distances, minimum time-limits, or strict rules (it can be adapted to your conditions, your relevant OAS stages or other badgework). It's your cycling adventure, and you can decide how you want your it to look and feel!

Where do I find more details?

Why was the event created?

Jamboree on Pedals aims to get more Scouts cycling and to motivate Groups, sections, and Patrols to consider adding a cycling activity to their programs. It is designed to support the implementation of the OAS across Australia and encourage cycling activities, appropriate for the skills, interests and needs of the youth. It was also intended that any funds raised would be reinvested into Scout Cycling across the country, since many of the teams are new (or newish) and getting funding for equipment and training can be barriers to running even more great cycling events.

Is JOP a Victorian event?

No. The event is being organised by the Victorian Scout Cycling Team for the time being, but it has never been intended to be only for Victorian Groups. The spread of the event in general has been limited due to COVID-19, but we would in-time like it to become a global event like JOTT, JOTA & JOTI.

To support the spread of JOP across Australia, and to support the development of Scout Cycling across all states, since 2021 any profits from badge sales are being split by state based on sales and shared with the respective State Cycling Team for use on purchasing equipment, training or whatever else they need to spend the funds on. For 2022, the event is being fully administered from Victoria, but it is planned involve other states in the planning and implementation from 2023 onwards.

How has JOP been communicated to the other states?

To date, it has been communicated directly to the respective Scout Cycling Teams in the other Australian states. In February 2021, it was communicated to State Leaders in WA, SA, QLD, and ACT (the states that contact details could be found for), prior to the second JOP in March 2021. This event was limited due to COVID-19 and participation was sporadic across the country. Prior to the third JOP in March 2022, it has been shared with those four states again, and to NSW and Tasmania once Cycling Team contacts were identified.

VET Report

Over the next few Newsletters there will be information on Scouting Pathways that <u>may</u> contribute to achieving VET qualifications through an RPL process with SAIT. Info on the Certificate II is more relevant to venturers as they can be included on their TCE at the end of year 12. The first 2 that are here are in the Outdoor Rec and Performing Arts areas. To assist gaining evidence Youth Members are able to access Scout Cloud and complete any relevant on-demand learning.

Introduction

- 1. These pathways have been drawn from the:
 - (a) Relevant qualifications in 'training.gov.au'.
 - (b) Approved SAIT 'Learning and Assessment Strategies'.
 - (c) Standards for RTOs for 'volume of learning'.
- 2. 'Adult members' are as defined in Scouts Australia National Policy and Rules and includes paid staff.
- 3. These Scouting pathways may contribute to candidates acquiring the knowledge and skills which may assist them in developing their portfolio of evidence for assessment.
- 4. The Assessor will request evidence based on the specific assessment requirements detailed in the units of competency in which the candidate is enrolled.
- 5. It is the responsibility of the Assessor to ensure that the Principles of Assessment and Rules of Evidence are observed as follows:
 - (a) Principles of Assessment; Fairness, Flexibility, Validity, Reliability
 - (b) Rules of Evidence; Validity, Sufficiency, Authenticity, Currency.

Outdoor Recreation/Leadership

SIS20419 Certificate II in Outdoor Recreation - This qualification reflects the role of individuals who assist with operational logistics and the delivery of recreational activities. They work under direct supervision and with guidance from those responsible for planning, finalising, and delivering activities, including program managers and leaders. Assistants use a range of fundamental activity techniques during activities and can work in indoor & outdoor recreation environments, adventure learning centres or camps. The combined skills and knowledge provided by this qualification do not provide for a job outcome as a leader and further training would be required before moving into those roles.

Learning associated with this qualification is embedded in both the Scouts Australia experiential learning of the Youth Program, the Wood Badge training program for adult members and activity specific training programs which use structured learning and practical experiences that contribute to learning by doing.

Participants: Youth and adult members.

Scouting pathway:

- Have at least six (6) months Scouting experience and completed the relevant learning pathways.
- Maintain an up-to-date activities log.
- Complete the Scouts Australia on-demand learning, Work Skills for Recreation.
- Youth members
 - > Complete Stage 5 Outdoor Adventure Skills in all three (3) Core activity streams, Bushwalking, Camping and Bushcraft Survival Skills.
 - > Complete Stage 5 in at least one additional activity stream from the Outdoor Adventure Skills.
- Adult members
 - > Have completed Scouting Essentials and Scouting Adventure.
 - > Complete Safe Participant in at least one additional adventurous activity other than bushwalking.

Performing Arts

CUA20220 Certificate II in Creative Industries - This qualification reflects the role of individuals with the skills and knowledge to perform in a range of varied activities in the creative industries where there is a defined range of contexts. It applies to work in different work environments that include entertainment, customer service, staging, television and radio production, broadcasting production, lighting and sound, theatre, scenery and set construction, screen and media, and film production. Individuals' complete tasks with limited complexity and with required actions clearly defined.

The learning associated with this qualification is integral in the conduct of Gang Shows and Showtime events that are organised and conducted by Youth and adult members of Scouts Australia. The pathway includes the use of on-demand learning, has defined structured learning and practical experiences through the Youth Program that contribute to learning by doing.

Participants: Youth and adult members.

Scouting pathway:

• Have completed at least two (2) seasons of the Scouts Australia community performances, Gang Show, Showtime, or equivalent experiences.
