Phil Harper, Emily Ezzy (our under 30 rep) and myself from Tassie. At the meeting, it was decided to change the frequency of Jamborees, Ventures and Moots from every 3

years to 4 years. Our Branch was against this as the Ventures will now be part of the Scout Jamborees. New Zealand is doing their events every four years. So, any Youth who might miss out on the Australian events can attend the New Zealand events. They are saying the Youth like attending overseas events more.

National is also looking at having pronouns put onto the end of names, for example, John Smith (he/his). They have given this task to the Diversity and Inclusion team to look at. Emily had a lot of input around the pronouns paper as she is the Diversity and Inclusion Commissioner. Thank you Emily for doing this for us.

Training Report

So we are well and truly into another year and we have a lot of Leader training for all our new and old leaders with some fantastic NEW training courses coming up over the next few months. If you are interested please put your applications in ASAP to make sure these courses go ahead as we have minimum numbers to allow courses to run.

I would like to note we are up on the NW coast for training and looking forward to having a great turnup as we did last year for the Scouting Essentials and Adventure courses. We have even put our first Pioneering training weekend AT Fulton Park and I would like to encourage anyone that would like to learn more about Pioneering (Building stuff out of spars and ropes) to come along, the more trainees we have the bigger and more "STUFF" we can build.

Later in the year there will be another Scouting Essentials, Scouting Adventure, Scouting Leadership, 1st Aid course, Bushwalking TP (Non-Alpine), Kayaking/Canoeing – Moving Water, and possibly Power Boat / PWC and another Pioneering weekend. There are other activities being considered that are included in the OAS and we would like to hear from anyone that is interested in being involved in any of the areas above as either a participant or assisting with training.

Cycling Team. The cycling team are running some safe cycling day courses (South, North and NW) in April so look out for the details and support this fantastic training for both Youth and adults. (flyer page 10).

So as you can see we have a lot of different activities for us to put the OUT in SCOUT, for more details watch the Newsletter, Facebook page and also check the calendar in MyScout as all Courses have the basic information listed there.

eLearning is an essential part of everyone's training and you need to complete the required eLearning before attending any Courses, including Adventurous Activity courses. Interesting fact that a lot of people do not know, eLearning is also available for Venturers to complete for any AA course i.e. Bushwalking, Abseiling and Kayak/Canoeing in the training portal.

Email reminders – mandatory eLearning

Just a reminder to check your junk email in case the early reminders for completion of the mandatory eLearning modules has slipped through into junk and you miss completing the units on time. The two mandatory units are **SPCHILD** - **Child Safe Scouting** and **SPWHS for Scouting**, and they are required to be undertaken every three years, along with your Police Check and renewal of your Working With Vulnerable Peoples Card. This is part of Scouts Australia response to being a Child Safe organisation.

I am often asked what is required to be completed when you agree to be a Leader so here is a brief list.

- 1 Complete Leader/Adult Helper Induction Pack which includes TOP1 Adult Member application, TOP3, TOP9, National Police Check, WWVP and Referee checks etc
- 2 Invested into the Group (Must have WWVP and police check returned)
- 3 eLearning WHS and Child safe plus the Scouting Essential eLearning

Training:

- 4 Scouting Essentials Course (TOP7 Leader Training required)
- 5 eLearning Scouting Adventure
- 6 Scouting Adventure Course (TOP7 Leader Training required)
- 7 In Service/ Technical task workbook
- 8 CoP Evaluation included with TOP5
- 9 TOP5 Application for CoP Certificate of Proficiency
- 10 eLearning Scouting Leadership or Management
- 11 Scouting Leadership or Management course (TOP7 Leader Training required)

For any Adventurous Activities

- 1 eLearning for particular AA
- 2 AA training (TOP7 Leader Training required)



One date of note this year is AGFEST, if you don't already know has been moved to the 24-27th August. We will be running the tower at AGFEST which is a fantastic PR event for Scouts and we will be looking for people that may be able to assist both as an abseil/climbing belayer etc. or assisting with the administration. Thommo is keen to hear from anyone able to assist.

Just a reminder that all activities we are currently running in Tasmania are subject to TOP's regulations and Risk Management requirements to ensure we meet our insurers guidelines and limitations. Once again can I ask people check their MyScout to confirm their AA Qualifications are up to date. All AA Qualification are now lined up with your 1st Aid Certificate, so once this expires so does your AA quals!! If your current qualifications are under a year old you should see the qualifications for bushwalking, boating etc recorded on the first page. You are looking for codes on your MyScout under the Qualifications tab such as CODE – TA AA BASIC BUSH (old code) or AA SP BUSHWALKING (new code) with an expiry date in the future. If your qualifications are over about a year old, look in your Archive folder or look for the letter from Branch stating when you were awarded the qualifications.

Please remember to record all your AA activities in your logbook (TOP 27). To update/record your AA appointments you need to fill in the TOP 31 – Activity Endorsement Application and send it into BHQ (training@tas.scouts.com.au) along with your 1st Aid, complete any required eLearning and send in your current logbook. Remember to use the new codes of – Safe Participant (SP) or Trained Participant (TP) instead of the old Level 1, 2 and 3. SP and TP, below is the definition:

Safe Participant (SP)- is a member who has undergone entry level training in an activity area and can operate under direct or indirect supervision depending on the activity area. On completion they possess elementary skills to participate safely with directions, understand the risks associated with the activity, and form part of an operational team. Apart from Bushwalking (tracked Environments), they are not recognised as holding a qualification to lead an activity, however in a learning sense they may participate in activity to further their skills, knowledge, and experience. It is desirable that an SP holds a current 1st Aid Qualification

Trained Participant (TP) - is a Member who holds all the **Safe Participant** requirements and has advanced through to the next level completing core units (VET or Scouting Skills) and having logged additional experience in more than one environment. e.g. different locations, weather conditions, or ages of participants. It is mandatory that a TP holds a current 1st Aid Qualification. Where the TP is a Youth member, an adult Leader with a suitable level of qualification must be present at the activity.

Injuries and Incidents

Another very important topic and one we all like to avoid is injuries and incident / near miss reporting. These can be recorded on TOP 25 (Injury) and TOP 26 (Incident) forms and are an important part of us meeting our Risk Management and required as part of our commitment to our insurance company. TOP 25's are a no brainer, and required for all injuries but many people will avoid filling out an incident or near miss. Reported incidents or near misses may assist us with preventing future injuries so they are equally as important!!

Saturday 2nd July – all holders of a Wood Badge are invited to catch up with their fellow Gilwellians at the Gilwell Reunion, The Lea Scout Centre from 5.30 pm. Nibbles, main course, dessert and cheese and biscuits, including all drinks, more information to come, but keep the date free and come along. As always partners are **very** welcome to attend.

• Please ensure TOP 7 forms are sent to Branch at least three weeks before a course to help us make sure the course can be run.

Cub Report




I hope you are well and COVID is not disrupting your Unit. There's a lot of it about unfortunately.



Relay for Life

On Saturday 26th March, **Hobart Gang Show** had a team of 14 in the Hobart Relay For Life ... which raises funds for the Tasmanian Cancer Council. The event took place at the Athletics Centre on the Domain. After the opening ceremony at 1.00 p.m. it was time to put on the Team "Baton" (a very recognizable red cape) and commence 20 hours of "relaying". This year there are nine new Hobart Gang Show cast members and seventeen former cast members, giving a total of 26 in cast this year.




