Scout Report

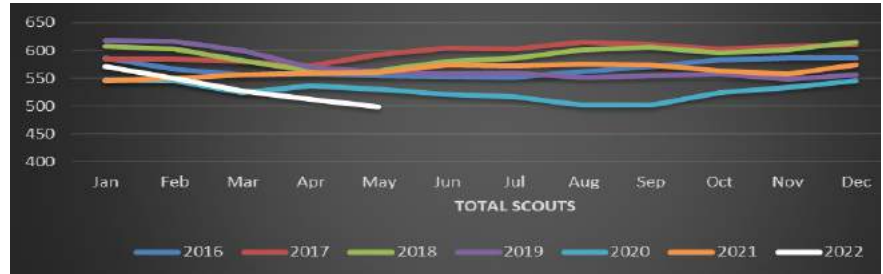


Welcome to June; we're nearly halfway through the Scouting year! Did your Scout Unit get out for JOTT last month? There were some good photos on the Facebook pages! Last weekend, I visited the Clarence and Wellington District Camps — there were about 20 Patrols and it was great to see so many Scouts having fun!

This month I'm talking about Numbers, COVID, Upcoming Events, Quiz, All-Leaders Weekend & Commissioner's Challenge.

Numbers

Unfortunately our decline has continued into May and our numbers in the Scout Section have fallen below 500. This is the lowest number in seven years and I am hopeful of a rebound! At the same time, Joeys, Cubs, and Rovers are also declining, but Joey numbers are high. Cubs has fallen to nearly 450 which is also the lowest in seven years.



We need to keep doing what we can to offer fun activities and the numbers will return when COVID is behind us.

COVID-19

On Sunday May 22nd, the Chief Commissioner sent around the revised Scouts Tasmania policy for keeping our members safe from COVID-19. I encourage every Leader to read it and to share it with all Scouts and their families. We are still requiring masks be worn and tent occupancy is still limited. Importantly, close contacts are not permitted at any Scouting activities. Please familiarise yourself with the policy.

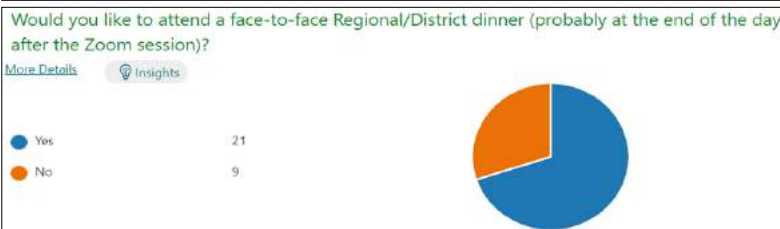
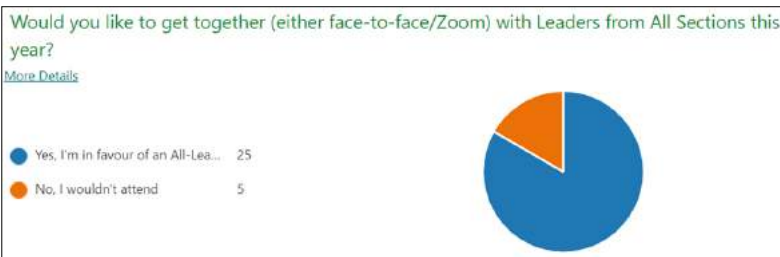

 - ⇒ their Patrol,
 - ⇒ their Unit, and
 - ⇒ another Group; and
- complete the Stage 3 (or higher) requirements of an Outdoor Adventure Skill from *any* of the nine streams.



It's not onerous, and most Scouts should achieve this just by coming to Scouts throughout the year! Many Districts share events such as buddy nights, Founder's Day, ANZAC and Remembrance Day, Leadership courses, District Camps, and District/Regional Events. I've set the bar low because I want it to be inclusive, and I want to encourage participation.

We continue to be grateful to receive never-ending lots of Scouting items. Recently we received boxes from ex-1st Lindisfarne Rover Crew & their current Scout Group, with over 32 Trophies, now cleaned and archived for prosperity, though hopefully for display during A.I.M. in Dec 22/Jan 23.

Add to this, many and various items : a beautiful 1971 hall opening plaque for 1st Montagu Bay (photo 1) & accompanying Clarence Sea Scouts, 1st Warrane & Rosny Scout Group pieces from Sue Hill; 1950's song sheets from Gang Show (photo 4), via Barry Cannock; various pieces ex-1st Evandale, 2nd Prince of Wales Sea Scouts, Blackmans Bay, from Rose Grant, Mike Hovington, Eunice Horn, Mike Wilson, Janet Stephens, plus unattributed other miscellaneous donors. These keep us thriving, donations always welcome, however kindly leave your name/address, and their heritage details when forwarding.

From some renovations undertaken at "Timbertop", by The Lea Service Crew, we were entrusted with their 1962 Tasmania Huon Crossing, Scout bushwalkers mail box (photo 3). There's a mystery story still to be uncovered here in the future, from its association with 1st Glenorchy Group Scouters.

Included within BHQ renovations we appreciate Mathew & his assistants efforts with restoration work on windows at the Centre. Much more warmer now, thanks.

Some more Milestones

I recently was able to finally accomplish restoring the complete 1948 Scout shirt of Noel Larsson, 10th Hobart (photo 2). He is, to date, the only known Tasmanian senior Scout qualified to wear the coveted Airmans Scout Award, which qualified him to become a King's Scout. The equivalent alternatives were for a Senior Sea Scout to attain his Seamans Award, or a Land Senior Scout to attain a Bushmans Thong Award, equally to qualify them for their Kings Scout Award, or a Queen's Scout Award post-1953 era.

Further, Team member Lyn Harvey has now updated / completed our Heritage Centre record of the Kings/Queen's Scouts for all Tasmania, emanating from early 1920's up until 2022. This follows on from the sterling efforts of Don Fitzpatrick.
