Welcome to August!

Corroboree

At Easter next year (29/3–1/4) at Fulton Park in Forth, Corroboree 2024 will be held. This is a preparation camp for Australian Jamboree 2025 ("AJ2025") and is targeted at those who'll be Scout age (11–14) when AJ2025 is held (https://aj2025.com.au/).



Scouts will camp in their Group/District with leaders by night and their Camp will self-cater.

During the days, the Scouts will likely participate in the following onsite activities:

- disc golf
- billy carts

- slippery slide
- laser tag
- catapults
- archery
- environment activity
- screen printing
- damper/bush doughnuts
- orienteering
- astronomy
- aboriginal crafts
- flying fox
- high ropes

and also the following likely offsite activities:

- mountain biking
- abseiling/climbing
- flying experience
- sailing/rowing
- white-water rafting
- city exploration

Each patrol of Scouts will need to be accompanied at camp by a leader, parents are required too — parents will camp in a separate area, but are needed to run activities. Each District will be allocated activities to run and without adult participation the camp could not occur. Parents staying overnight will need a WWVP card.

Scouts In Action Month



Numbers



Well, the slow climb we'd experienced from April–June has ceased and we've lost 27 Scouts since June! We're now at 456. It's been a poor picture during July in many sections sadly — leaders down by 10 (to 331), Venturers down by 25 (to 141), Rovers down by 4 (to 50). Once again, there is hope on the horizon via the pipeline with Joey numbers unchanged (205) and Cubs increasing by 7 (to 424.

With regard to the Scout numbers, two Groups have lost 5 Scouts each, four have lost 3 Scouts each, and six have lost 1 or 2. But in good news, two groups have increased their Scout numbers and I'd like to welcome New Norfolk back to Scouting from a period of closure. Well done to those concerned.

If you have a Scout leave, could you please ask the reasons, and either ask them or their parents to complete a short 'exit survey' or, could you fill it in on their behalf? The link is: https://forms.office.com/r/HXvjqDWV4b Despite the 'loss' of 27 — and many could have moved up to Venturers, there's no new data for Scouts during July and I don't know what has happened to those Scouts or why. And we can't do anything useful if we don't know what we're responding to!

Commissioner's Challenge Competition!

This year the Commissioner's Challenge badge will be designed by a Scout. And perhaps it'll be one of your Scouts! Please share the competition with them and invite them to send their designs to me. This can be done by sending a photo of a drawing or by emailing a digital design. The winning design will be chosen by the District Scout Leaders and will be put on a 7.5x7.5cm badge. (It doesn't have to be square but it has to fit into the square!)

Cuboree

Arrrr, this year be a Cuboree year, and the theme be Pirates!



A Scout or two will be required to support each patrol of Cubs. Scout leaders, could you please talk to your Cub leaders and also start talking to your Scouts to determine who would be a good choice to assist. Clark Trophy

Finally, a reminder that in fourth term (November 18th and 19th) the next Clark Trophy will be held. It's a light-weight hike camp this year and will be held near Oatlands. Patrols will be spread around the property camping in tents within 500m of a couple of leaders and need to walk around the property over two days solving problems at 'nodes' with leaders and answering questions scattered around the property as 'point-to-points'. It's a great fun weekend of independence and enjoyment for the Scouts and attendance from all Groups is encouraged. Please ensure it's in your Calendar and please try to avoid organising other camps/activities at that time.


Introducing the new Joey Scout Hop

Leader Training and Support

Upcoming training is listed below and please make sure you put in your TOP 7 to Branch ASAP this needs to be done at least three weeks before any Courses to help us make sure the course can be run. Here is a list of upcoming training and dates:

4WD SP/TP 13-14th August

Abseiling TP - 25-27th August

For any leader wishing to complete their WOODBADGE BEADS the Scouting Leadership course will be run this year (assuming we have enough applicants!!!) on 1st day – 2nd September with a full weekend on the 27-29th October. Please put your application in ASAP to make sure this runs this year.

Are you having issues keeping your hours up? Maybe consider coming along to a training course as a mentor or participant.

Last month I explained the new On the Job Training (OJT) that we all now have to use. One point that I just want to make clear is the is 3 OJT sections and you only needs to do the section that applies to your current training i.e. YSL (Youth Support Leader) is for section leader that is leaders leading the youth and PSL (Program Support Leader) is for all the Leader of Adults i.e. GL's, DC's DSL's etc. and SL (Scouting Leadership) which is for anyone doing their Wood Badge.

IAVP's (Individual Adult Volunteer Plans). As part of nationals changes to leader signup and reviews, all leaders are required to complete an IAVP, when they are first signed up, complete their COP (Certificate of Proficiency) or Wood badge or every 3 years during a review process. This is an alternative to the 3 year review that some leaders will have already done. Over the next 12 months we will be looking at having all leaders complete an IAVP with their Team Leader or mentor. Sample below

Individual Adult Volunteer Plan Phase 1 The Individual Adult Volunteer Plan Phase 1 should accompany the application for adult membership and be completed for an adult member changing roles. The expectation is that this Phase will be achieved no later than 12 months after joining the Movement or assuming a new role within the Movement. If unable to tick each box, and your Team leader is unable to assist, refer to your next level up Team Leader or Branch Office for assistance. I have received; a copy of my role description the Code of Ethics and Code of Conduct (Policy & Rules P5.2) I have discussed what I would like to achieve in Scouting with my Team Leader I have identified and agreed current proficiencies1 relevant to the role with my Team Leader I understand my rights and responsibilities as listed in the Mutual Agreement (Policy & Rules P5.3.5) I commit to completing the requirements of the Certificate of Proficiency relevant to my role by 2 Refer Training Plan overleaf I am aware who will provide me with support towards achieving a Certificate of Proficiency, that person being I understand that should I not complete the requirements of the Certificate of Proficiency I will participate in an Adult Volunteer Performance Plan with my Team Leader. VET enrolments

There are currently 57 Leaders, staff and Venturers enrolled in various qualifications, skill sets and units of competency.

The most popular qualifications are the Certificate II, III & IV in outdoor skills/leadership with 23 students. This includes a number Venturers and leaders involved in the Cert III in outdoor leadership at the Lea.

Qualifications issued this year.

So far, we have issued a Diploma in Project Management, Certificate IV in outdoor leadership, a Certificate II in outdoor recreation and some training units. The second half or the year will be busy as a number of students are close to completing their qualifications.

Our assessors are busy working with Tasmanian and interstate students.

BC VET Conference

This is free to Leaders, Rovers, Venturers and staff!

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) assessment is used to gain externally accredited qualifications.


What does Scouting means to you? How long have you been a Scout? (For example: Joey – Rovers)
